


Why Have a Comprehensive Emergency Plan?


- An emergency plan <u>specifies</u> procedures for handling emergencies.
- Its objectives should be to:
 - Reduce the possible consequences of the emergency
 - Prevent or reduce the loss of life and injuries
 - Reduce damage to infrastructure
 - Protect the environment
 - Accelerate the return to normal daily activities

Comprehensive Emergency Management Planning Concept

- Comprehensive emergency management planning involves:
 - A cycle of phased, coordinated and mutually supporting activities
 - Conducted at each level of government
 - Before, during, and after an emergency
- Addresses the activities associated with...
 - Prevention / Mitigation
 - Preparedness
 - Response
 - Recovery

...for all hazards







- Step 1: Formulate project planning team
 - (NDEM staff, State Agencies, Private Sector)
- Step 2: Understand the situation
 - Background, research and lots of reading
 - Review threats and hazards
 - Assess risk



- Step 3: Determine goals and objectives
 - Determine operational priorities
 - Set goals and objectives
- Step 4: Plan development
 - Develop and analyze course of action
 - Identify resources
 - Identify information and intelligence needs



- Step 5: Plan preparation, review and approval
 - Write plan
 - Section One Basic Plan
 - Section Two Emergency Support Functions
 - Section Three Annexes and appendices
 - Synchronize among SEOC, ESF and others
 - Coordinate among other plans
 - Technical Edit
 - Legal Review
 - Approval
 - Publish and disseminate



- Step 6: Plan implementation and maintenance
 - Exercise the plan
 - Review, revise and maintain the plan




Project Goal


 Produce an updated SCEMP that is NIMS, EMAP and CPG 101 compliant published by October 1, 2013



SCEMP Guiding Principles

- Describe WHAT Nevada does in emergencies rather than describe HOW Nevada gets the job done
- Serve as the umbrella or framework standard to align and tie-in other state plans
- Standardize the language format (multiple authors)





SCEMP Guiding Principles

- Leaner, Easier to Read
- More Strategic
- Eliminate Procedural Components
- Encompass the Requirements of:
 - NIMS
 - EMAP
 - CPG 101 v2

Project Approach

- In six months:
 - Conduct six SCEMP Planning Team meetings
 - Draft the "backbone" or outline of revised
 SCEMP
 - Conduct 2-3 "one-on-one" sessions with ESFs
 - Produce coordinating draft of Basic Plan
 - Receive & review all draft ESF Annexes
 - Conduct reviews (program, legal, executive)


