The City of Henderson is seeking Equipment funding for a Structural Collapse Rescue Truck and Trailer including one 1-ton, full-sized truck with crew cab, long bed, dual rear wheels that is outfitted with a utility bed, emergency response equipment, and emergency response decals. Also requesting one 32' trailer with 8' upper deck, goose-neck triple axle, custom metal racks, 10K diesel generator pack, interior and exterior lights, (2) 14' power awnings, (4) scene lights, rear ramp extension, 30 amp electrical package, (2) 12v deep cycle batteries, spare tire, (2) 15K BTU A/C with heat, and emergency response decals. The truck and trailer's additional capacity will allow rescue technicians to quickly and effectively respond to multi-jurisdictional structural collapse incidents involving any construction type and make substantial progress towards meeting the SPR target of completing search and rescue activities within seven days for 50,000 people.

The requested Structural Collapse Rescue Truck and Trailer meets Nevada's 2023 Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR) Report priorities under the Mass Search and Rescue Operations core capability. The SPR has identified a target response capability equal to conducting search and rescue operations for 50,000 people requiring rescue within seven days of an incident occurrence. Currently, only 50% of that target has been achieved. The Henderson Fire Department has interlocal agreements in place to provide mutual response for technical rescue incidents throughout Southern Nevada. In the event of a mass terroristic or seismic event that occurs anywhere in the Las Vegas Urban Area (LVUA), the Henderson Fire Department (HFD) will respond. Currently, the capabilities of HFD's technical rescue response are limited by the capacity of the existing equipment. The requested Structural Collapse Rescue Truck and Trailer will enhance the HFD technical rescue team's capabilities by allowing them to support multiple target areas and multiple construction types at the onset of a collapse event. Acquiring this equipment will significantly increase additional equipment capacity and can assist in narrowing the gap in the region's capabilities, as identified in the 2023 SPR report for the Las Vegas area. Additionally, procuring the truck and trailer will positively impact another SPR core capability, Fatality Management Services, by facilitating more expedient fatality recovery.

Describe the investment or project, specifically how it addresses gaps and/or sustainment in the Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA)/Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR).

The requested Structural Collapse Rescue Truck and Trailer will enhance the Henderson Fire Department (HFD) technical rescue team's capabilities by allowing them to support multiple target areas and multiple construction types at the onset of a collapse event, such as a terrorist attack or an earthquake. HFD is one of only three teams regionally to be trained and equipped to respond to structural collapse incidents. Currently, the technical rescue team is limited to the tow and load capacity of the existing trailer and truck. The equipment's 10,000-pound limit only allows the team to carry enough equipment and shoring supplies to mitigate events involving Type V lightweight building construction. Replacing the current equipment with the requested Structural Collapse Rescue Truck and Trailer will significantly improve capacity and permit responders to carry enough materials to provide an effective initial response to high occupancy events with conventional or industrial construction (Type I through Type IV). Many members of HFD's technical rescue team are members of FEMA's Nevada Task Force-1 response team. They have already been trained to respond to large-scale events; however, the lack of equipment and supply capacity does not permit the effective application of this knowledge, training, and experience for major events that may take place in the Las Vegas Urban Area (LVUA). The enhancement of collapse rescue capability was identified as a medium priority in the 2023 SPR report for the Las Vegas area. The acquisition of the requested Structural Collapse Rescue Truck and Trailer will result in significant additional capacity and can narrow the gap in the region's capabilities. Adding this capacity will make substantial progress toward the SPR target of conducting search and rescue activities within seven days of an incident for 50,000 people.

Please explain how your project demonstrates a nexus to achieving target capabilities related to preventing, preparing for, protecting against, and responding to acts of terrorism

This project will allow the City of Henderson to quickly and effectively respond to events where mass search and rescue operations are necessary due to terroristic or seismic events within

the Southern Nevada region. The Henderson Fire Department is one of only three teams in the region that are trained and equipped to respond to structural collapse incident types. The improved capacity of the requested Structural Collapse Rescue Truck and Trailer will help the Las Vegas Urban Area (LVUA) move toward the objective of completing search and rescue activities within seven days of a collapse event for 50,000 people. The equipment would enhance Henderson Fire's capabilities to respond to these incidents by increasing the construction types that can be addressed from only Type V (lightweight construction) to Types I through V, which includes high-rise buildings. This enhancement would allow Henderson Fire to provide effective initial response to any major collapse event occurring in the LVUA.

What is the overall goal for this project?

The goal of this project is to increase regional rescue capabilities by providing rapid and effective response to multi-casualty collapse events within the Las Vegas Urban Area. The requested Structural Collapse Rescue Truck and Trailer will significantly improve capacities and make substantial progress towards meeting the SPR target of completing search and rescue activities within seven days of an incident for 50,000 people. HFD already has highly skilled technicians to assist with complex rescues; however, the current equipment will only support lightweight construction. The requested truck and trailer will allow HFD technical rescue technicians to coordinate an immediate, effective, multi-targeted response for any construction type.

The City of Henderson's Purchasing Division will be responsible for facilitating the Request for Proposal under the direction from Richard Johnson, Logistics Division Chief. The Henderson Fire Department's (HFD) Logistics Division Chief will gather the equipment specifications, evaluate the proposals received, negotiate with vendors, approve the contract, and issue the purchase order. The Logistics Division Chief will also oversee the delivery and in-service of the equipment, as well as collect feedback regarding the equipment's performance and effectiveness. The HFD technical rescue team shift captains will be responsible for daily and weekly equipment inspections and maintaining the trailer inventory. The City's Fleet Division will maintain the equipment on a regular maintenance schedule and assume responsibility for any repairs that become necessary. Quarterly grant reporting, financial reporting, and grant closeout will be performed by HFD's Senior Fire Department Business Analyst, Monica Day.

This project falls under the National Priority Area Projects of "enhancing community preparedness and resilience." This will be accomplished through having our full heavy rescue technician team personnel certified and licensed to a standard that provides us the flexibility and mobility to deploy response and logistical assets without vulnerabilities and limitations. Local responses will be facilitated utilizing our new technical heavy rescue unit and augmented response platforms.

From a national perspective, this capability provides the department additional certified personnel to bolster the FEMA Nevada Task Force 1 Team deployment potential. Some of the core capabilities this project addresses are situational assessment, logistics and supply, chain management as well as threats and hazards identification.

Describe the investment or project, specifically how it addresses gaps and/or sustainment in the Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA)/Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR).

The 2023 THIRA for the Las Vegas Valley identified multiple simulated response gaps that require further bolstering and investment (time and training). This project specifically seeks to reinforce our response capabilities for four vulnerable response scenarios (French Mountain earthquake, mass-casualty attack, tunnel poisoning gas attack, and rail tanker accident) identified for improvement. The CCFD Heavy Rescue Team is a multi-disciplined trained response team that would be responding based on emergent need and unified command and needs based requests.

The investment we are requesting will cover the costs of our technical rescue team obtaining CDL certification as well as the costs of beginning the CCFD's Train-The-Trainer Program. This project demonstrates a nexus of achieving target capabilities related to acts of terrorism by enabling three fire department agencies - currently using some sort of preplanning tool - to communicate utilizing the same software. The three agencies' tools are not the same, do not collect the same information, and do not share information within the same organization or other organizations in real-time. The software will give agencies the ability to capture critical information relating to target hazards in real-time and share information with all users, but, most importantly, with unified incident commanders with speed and ease never before seen locally.

The tool will also allow HAZMAT inspectors to share the same types of information with unified incident commanders and relating to Tier -Two facilities. The Clark County Fire Department, for one, has never had any capability to information share between the prevention and suppression divisions. This software will bridge the gap between planning, prevention, and response.

Real-time response as well as logistical and training disciplines are coordinated and handled through this position. This skillset is mission critical to the deployment and preparedness of the Incident Management Team to include logistics, planning, inventory control, recruitment, and real-world deployment.

This technology will enhance that ability by providing a multi-user rapidly deployable platform that allows for simple setup and use during large scale critical events where communications may be hindered or compromised.

Part-Time Personnel: The continued funding of this position directly addresses multiple facets of the THIRA risk-assessment profiles. Community resilience, fire management and suppression, mass-care services, as well as operational communications, are identified threats that require continued vigilance and support. This position has a daily hands-on impact directly affecting those outcomes.

Mini-CRD : The 2023 THIRA for the Las Vegas valley lists current gaps and the need for this mission critical communication equipment. Per the THIRA, Operational Coordination Target No. 1 is an area that needed improvement. Through better technology and training we will be more effective in coordinating strategic capabilities utilizing a truly unified and coordinated command structure. The downstream effect also gives us the bandwidth to rapidly coordinate all vested partners and response agencies during large-scale incidents in Southern Nevada. This project will address this communications gap by enhancing operational and emergency management seamless integration through a technological communications platform that ensures redundancy and interoperability.

Part Time Personnel: Staffing of this integral component of the Incident Management Team (IMT) is the key link to achieving target capabilities and fulfilling the goal of preparing, preventing, and responding to acts of terrorism. The structure and framework of the IMT sets, augments, and bolsters our ability to prepare and respond to these incidents.

Mini CRD:The 2023 THIRA for Clark County identified threats and hazards to which existing capabilities were measured. This project will ensure that the urban area will be better prepared by maintaining strategic capabilities involving operational coordination built by previous UASI funding which sought to integrate all critical stakeholders during incidents in Southern Nevada.

Current multi-jurisdictional response systems primarily rely on a sequence of radios and repeaters. This project will not only augment those capabilities, but allow for further scalability and real time nimble adaptation if the incident warrants. Agencies throughout the valley respond to real time emergency calls as well as predesignated special events. By utilizing this platform, we will be more effective in both endeavors.

This system utilizes dedicated first responder cell connectivity and satellite link systems that allow for a seamless push to talk communications system. Communications is frequently listed as the biggest hinderance in after action reports for real life calls. This will help close that deficiency gap.

What is the overall goal for this project?

The overall goal of these projects is to help fortify our already robust communication system with a nearly failproof augmented system that gives us multiple communications options as well as prepare, plan, train and ensure effective response when needed through the IMT. The communications system utilizes cell tower and satellite link capabilities to deliver the intended result. Our personnel will be able to use and deploy this system in real time and special event scenarios with coordination and expertise utilizing the part time staff position.

The proposed project would provide target hardening for Clark County Water Reclamation District (CCWRD)'s primary facility.

Under the FFY 2024 National Priorities, the camera expansion directly addresses the core capabilities of "Physical Protective Measures" and "Intelligence and Information Sharing". By enhancing our monitoring capabilities, we can more effectively detect, deter, and respond to

threats at this important facility. The new surveillance equipment will allow us to augment security personnel's capacity to monitor additional areas of our 450+ acre main campus and quickly respond to issues in this area. Additionally, having areas that can be effectively monitored will allow the agency to share credible information regarding suspicious activity, potential acts of terrorism or violence, or other issues important to law enforcement and homeland security through video evidence versus eyewitness reports. Enhancing the Protection of Soft Targets/Crowded Places is a National Priority, which includes target hardening for critical infrastructure.

Describe the investment or project, specifically how it addresses gaps and/or sustainment in the Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA)/Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR).

CCWRD participated in the THIRA/SPR. Within the THIRA/SPR, CCWRD identified they were able to respond to line breaks. The focus of the THIRA/SPR for critical infrastructure was on a natural disaster. However, a gap exists in the physical protective measures of public managed critical infrastructure facilities per the 2023 SPR. This aligns with our own security assessments to address physical protective measures gaps on our main treatment campus. By awarding this grant, it will allow us to increase our own capacity, and therefore the capability of the physical protective measures identified in the SPR.

Please explain how your project demonstrates a nexus to achieving target capabilities related to preventing, preparing for, protecting against, and responding to acts of terrorism

The surveillance equipment enhancements will support the early detection of potential terrorist threats and suspicious activities, increasing our capabilities of security personnel, and acting as a deterrent. This equipment will allow real-time monitoring of the critical areas of our wastewater treatment plant to any unusual activities. This area currently is remote and provides an easier access point to individuals. It will contribute to preparedness by providing data and surveillance footage that can be used to help in creating realistic scenarios for emergency drills, enhancing the readiness of our security team, and can provide actionable data to our law enforcement and homeland security partners regarding suspicious activities in relation to critical infrastructure. Unlike security personnel, this can protect our critical infrastructure by continuously monitoring vulnerable points. It will help safeguard the perimeter and control access to sensitive areas, reducing the likelihood of successful attacks. Having this system in place aids in the immediate response to an incident. The ability to quickly access real-time visual information from the scene of an incident helps our security team in strategizing their response more effectively and safely. Additionally, in the event an act of terrorism occurs, it provides real-time data to command staff responding to the incident to make decisions on response activities.

What is the overall goal for this project?

Our overall goal for enhancing our surveillance footprint is to grow our ability to safeguard critical infrastructure. By strategically placing surveillance cameras in areas where we have gaps, we create a watchful eye over critical areas of our water treatment plant. Our goal is to prevent trespass incidents, which have occurred in the past in this area, and to deter any unauthorized access. The added surveillance will also serve as a vital tool against targeted violence or terrorist acts against critical infrastructure, which are encouraged by numerous

groups such as homegrown violent extremists and foreign terrorism organizations.

The new monitoring capability will allow us to intercept, disrupt, or secure against any threats directed toward the facility from this area of the facility. In case of an emergency, we can swiftly identify, discover, or locate hazards through active and passive surveillance. This proactive approach will minimize any disruptions to our critical infrastructure functions.

The overall benefit to the state ties to the mission of the agency. CCWRD is a critical infrastructure agency under the water systems lifeline, providing wastewater services to unincorporated Clark County, which includes the Las Vegas Strip, Allegiant Stadium, and over 250,000 customers. Our wastewater treatment processes are vital to the public health and sanitation of the Clark County Community. Our main facility, the focus of this grant request, is a crucial part of the water care cycle for reclaimed flow credits. CCWRD's treatment process allows our community to utilize additional credits of the Colorado River water our community relies on to survive. Enhancing our protection capabilities ensures we can complete our mission for the community.

The LVMPD All-Hazard Regional Multi-Agency Operations and Response (ARMOR) Task Force has two primary missions, responding to criminal CBRNE events and providing robotic support during tactical operations. ARMOR is a component of the LVMPD Homeland Security and Special Operations Division's Southern Nevada Counter Terrorism Center. The task force is comprised of personnel representing the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department, Henderson Police Department, North Las Vegas Police Department and Nevada State Police. ARMOR has been recognized by the Nevada Division of Emergency Management/Homeland Security in a recent Homeland Security Commission Annual Report as an investment to improve the resilience of the State by maintaining strategic capabilities. ARMOR is a state asset capable of deploying outside of southern Nevada to assist jurisdictions with the investigation and mitigation of CBRNE threats.

When responding to criminal CBRNE events in southern Nevada, ARMOR is the investigative and operational unit responsible for identifying threats, collecting evidence, and mitigating the situation. During tactical situations, ARMOR provides robotic support to southern Nevada SWAT teams during responses to all criminal barricades, hostage rescue situations and high-risk search warrant services.

ARMOR is requesting funding for one advanced robotic system (03OE-07-ROBT) capable of performing the tasks associated with ARMOR mission-space which include but are not limited to CBRNE/hazardous material operations, tactical law enforcement operations, and large-scale special event support. This project will address the FFY 2024 National Priority Area core capabilities associated with Enhancing Protection of Soft Targets/Crowded Places.

The Department of Homeland Security has recognized soft targets and crowded places as appealing to terrorist/violent extremists because of accessibility and the large number of targets. In the last year, ARMOR has supported and/or staffed over two dozen special events in Southern Nevada which included multi-day operational periods associated with EDC, the Stanley Cup, Formula One, NYE, and the Superbowl. In support of these events, ARMOR implements and organizes the scalable multi-jurisdictional, multi-disciplinary Joint Hazard Assessment Team (JHAT) model capable of identifying and mitigating any CBRNE threats, responding to active shooter situations and/or terrorist attacks. ARMOR requests assistance as needed from local, State, and federal resources according to size, location, intelligence, and Special Event Assessment Rating (SEAR) related to the event. ARMOR Task Force responsibilities support the five mission areas and the Core Capabilities delineated by the National Preparedness Goal related to Enhancing the Protection of Soft Targets/Crowded Places.

This specific project aims to sustain two of those Core Capabilities, Interdiction & Disruption and Screening, Search and Detection. The two Core Capabilities apply to the prevention and protection mission delineated in FEMA National Preparedness Goal.

The requested robot will be standardized equipment in support of Interdiction & Disruption efforts by providing the capability to perform certain critical tasks associated with CBRNE hazards while limiting the threat and/or potential exposure to law enforcement and other first responders. Due to advances in technology, combined with ARMOR's current technology & mission space, a new robot will assist ARMOR in identifying CBRNE hazards and their precursors, rendering safe and disposing of CBRNE hazards, and conducting tactical counterterrorism operations, potentially in multiple locations and in all environments.

The requested robot will support screening, search, and detection efforts by providing a means to actively search and locate terrorist threats with the use of systematic examinations and assessments, bio-surveillance, sensor technologies, and or physical investigation and intelligence. The ability to introduce current robot technology will facilitate an efficient search for

human and/or CBRNE threats, provide real-time information and intelligence while limiting risk and exposure to law enforcement personnel.

Additionally, the robot platform will support ARMOR's current assets/technologies and build upon current capabilities related to LETPA supported activities of chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear detection.

Describe the investment or project, specifically how it addresses gaps and/or sustainment in the Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA)/Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR).

The Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment identifies potential incidents which will impact our community and challenge our resources and capabilities. The ARMOR Task Force will have a direct role in the response to three of the hypothetical scenarios, specifically the Mass Casualty Attack (Complex Coordinated Terrorist Attack), Tunnel Poisoning Gas Attack (Chemical Attack), and HAZMAT Release – Rail Tanker Accident (HAZMAT Release). Robotic support would undoubtedly be utilized in conjunction with ARMOR's current assets/technologies during the tactical and/or criminal CBRNE response and mitigation phase of each scenario. Currently, the ARMOR Task Force is facing a technological gap and sustainment issue with regards to robotics. In the last year, three previously grant funded robot platforms have become inoperable and/or unreliable during dynamic situations primarily due to obsolete technology. Until mid-2023, ARMOR maintained two response trucks, each with three robot platforms capable of responding and providing robotic support at two separate incidents. Currently, we cannot sustain the previous response capability.

The Remotec Wolverine was a UASI grant purchase in 2004. ARMOR communicated with Remotec and learned the Wolverine can be updated with current technology. The cost of upgrading the Wolverine will be approximately \$271,000, which is greater than the price of a technologically relevant new robot platform with warranty. Furthermore, the Wolverine experienced a motherboard failure, which in this case is catastrophic because Remotec no longer manufactures and/or has parts in stock to repair it. Historically this would be a sustain project in order to maintain capability.

The Remotec F6 was a TSGP (Transit Security Grant Program) grant purchase in 2007. ARMOR communicated with Remotec and learned the F6 can be updated with current technology. The cost of upgrading the F6 will be \$238,500, which is approximately the same price as a new robot platform. The F6 can only be operated within close distances within line of sight of the operating control unit (OCU) and antenna before reliability of the platform drops significantly. When functionality is lost, it creates an obstruction and unnecessary delays in providing the tactical commanders valuable intelligence which contributes the de-escalation of the incident. Historically, this would be a sustain project in order to maintain capability.

The Remotec Mark5 was purchased in 2005 and using obsolete analog signal to transmit between the operating control unit and the robot itself. Analog signals are significantly lower quality signals compared to digital signals and more susceptible interference and distortion. Furthermore, due to outdated technology, combined with intermittent signal transmission, this robot is not suitable for dynamic events when real-time information gathering/sharing, and maneuverability are imperative to decision-making related to the de-escalation of critical events. Currently, there is no upgrade package for the Mark5, but it could possibly be updated with F6 componentry for an approximate cost of \$238,500.

The LVMPD ARMOR Task Force is requesting funding for one new robot (03OE-07-ROBT) capable of performing tasks within the unit's mission-space. The robot will be deployed into high-risk tactical situations which encompass motivations across the ideological spectrum as well as hazardous material environments while reducing the exposure of law enforcement. Equipped with specialized sensors, cameras, communication systems, and arms capable of manipulation, the robots will be tasked with gathering intelligence, relaying information to command centers, and remotely engaging potential threats, minimizing the risk to first responders. Within the last two years, the ARMOR Task Force has demonstrated the value and solidified the necessity for robotic support during responses to criminal, ideological or grievance motivated violent events as well as clandestine and/or hazardous environments. This project description along with the meticulous documentation related to the real-life missions undertaken by the ARMOR Task Force throughout southern Nevada in support of all jurisdictions demonstrates the nexus to achieving target capabilities related to preventing, preparing for, protecting against, and responding to acts of terrorism.

What is the overall goal for this project?

The overall goal of this project is to provide southern Nevada with a technologically advanced robot (03OE-07-ROBT) which can address a variety of threats while enhancing the safety of first responders. The ARMOR Task Force is regional asset capable of deploying throughout the State of Nevada to address CBRNE threats and tactical situations. As of April 2022, the ARMOR Task Force has not turned down any requests for assistance and/or service related to a tactical and/or CBRNE responses from any jurisdiction. All jurisdictions within southern Nevada have been beneficiaries of a consistent and timely response from the ARMOR when requested.

In 2022, the ARMOR Task Force was requested and responded with robotic support to a combined 101 events between LVMPD, HPD, and NLVPD. These events included, clandestine labs, criminal barricades, hostage situations, and high-risk search warrants. Most robotic support operations consisted of deploying at least two robot platforms, but in some cases three.

ARMOR Task Force jurisdictional support breakdown:

LVMPD – 62 Events

HPD – 21 Events

NLVPD – 39 Events

In 2023, the ARMOR Task Force was requested and responded with robotic support to a combined 100 events between LVMPD, HPD, and NLVPD. These events included, clandestine labs, criminal barricades, hostage situations, active shooters, officer involved shootings and high-risk search warrants. Most robotic support operations consisted of deploying at least two robot platforms, but in some cases three.

ARMOR Task Force jurisdictional support breakdown:

This grant directly supports LVMPD's coordinated tactical response to terrorism threats by procuring simunition training aids, night vision goggles, drones, binoculars, breaching tools, and EOC equipment and supplies. This equipment will increase LVMPD's ability to ensure operational coordination, interdiction and disruption, and screening/searching/detection for soft targets and large crowds. As seen historically, terrorism threats most frequently take place within soft targets, and crowded places such as special events. This grant will increase LVMPD's posture to better respond to acts of terrorism at special events and soft targets.

This investment justification addresses the gaps identified as it relates to acts and threats of terrorism within the THIRA and Stakeholder Preparedness Review. The equipment in this grant will better prepare LVMPD to respond to acts of terrorism, specifically an active shooter event that has been seen historically. All of the equipment in this grant will better prepare LVMPD to respond to a threat at a population of mass gathering. As acknowledged in the 2023 Las Vegas THIRA a complex coordinated terrorist attack in which immense crowds at soft targets and crowded spaces is addressed as a threat based on Las Vegas hosting numerous events that draw hundreds of thousands of visitors. The 2023 National Preparedness Report also acknowledges active shooter as one of the five most challenging threats and hazards. The line items on this grant also directly align with the capability target for operational coordination which is recognized in the 2023 SPR.

This project directly relates to terrorism as LVMPD is the first responder agency that would respond to threats and acts of terrorism taking place within Clark county at special events, soft targets, crowded places, and critical infrastructure. The proposed project to support the position of Public Health Preparedness Analyst linked with the Southern Nevada Health District (SNHD) is directly related to the national priority area of: Enhancing Information and Intelligence Sharing and Analysis. SNHD is an active community partner, supporting multiple agencies concerning weapons of mass destruction and chemical/biological/radiological/nuclear/explosive prevention, detection, and response, including communication, and coordination for potential threats to the community. The Public Health Preparedness Analyst position duties also support National and State Strategic priorities through the Community Preparedness and Resilience area and participation with the Southern Nevada Healthcare Preparedness Coalition (SNHPC), Southern Nevada Counter-Terrorism Center (SNCTC) and partnerships with community and fusion center agencies.

Describe the investment or project, specifically how it addresses gaps and/or sustainment in the Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA)/Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR).

The Public Health Preparedness Analyst is with the SNHD Office of Public Health Preparedness and this position serves as a public health liaison between the SNHD (OPHP and Disease Surveillance), local law enforcement, and other agencies at the Southern Nevada Counter Terrorism Center. The PHP Analyst uses public health data and performs analyses of public health and fusion center data sources using appropriate analytical methods to identify potential public health threats and hazards, nexus to terrorism, and other emerging threats. These identified threats may be from natural causes or related to bioterrorism incidents. The PHP Analyst has the following main tasks within their job description; to identify and present data sources in a confidential environment to be used for information sharing applications; to manage data sets and ensure the data are of high quality; to interpret the analysis and prepare comprehensive reports under general supervision; participates in site visits and inspections as deemed necessary and appropriate to fulfill duties; performs a variety of duties involved in data analysis, implementation, coordination, and maintenance; and performs related intelligence and information sharing duties as assigned.

Currently, one of the top threats to Nevada, as identified in the 2023 THIRA/Stakeholder Preparedness Review, is a pandemic event. Additionally, the THIRA indicates the following threats for Southern Nevada: a cyber attack, drought, flood, earthquake, railway hazmat release, mass casualty attack, chemical, extreme heat due to a utility failure, and wildfire. The PHP Analyst can provide public health and healthcare analysis and information sharing among all agencies represented in the SNCTC.

The inclusion of a Public Health representative in the SNCTC is a nationally recognized best practice that is sustained through this investment. This position supports Nevada, the SNHD, and SNCTC efforts to mitigate bioterrorism, and work performed addresses the following gaps in the 2023 THIRA/SPR.

Mitigation of Threats:

1. Pandemic, MCI Patient Tracking, and HAZMAT Release
2. Cyberattack - An attack on infrastructure (Public Health and Healthcare)

FEMA Mission and Core Capabilities:

1. Prevention/Protection: Intelligence and Information Sharing
2. Public Information and Warning (Cross-Cutting)
3. Protection: Cybersecurity: Screening, Search, Detection
4. Response: Public Health, healthcare, and emergency medical services (significant Capability Gap)
5. Recovery: Health and Social Services

This position/investment's duties address high-priority gaps that remain, such as Intelligence and Information Sharing, an effort to mitigate negative trends, and a gap in hiring and retaining experienced staff. This investment also seeks to provide information on cybersecurity threats to the Healthcare and Public Health sector.

Please explain how your project demonstrates a nexus to achieving target capabilities related to preventing, preparing for, protecting against, and responding to acts of terrorism

The SNCTC/SNHD PHP Analyst monitors for any possible links to a potential biological attack that may occur or may be a threat to Nevada and the jurisdiction. Emerging potential terrorist threats are shared through information sharing reports which allows for public health to assist with planning and mitigation efforts for agency operations and activities.

What is the overall goal for this project?

SNHD will be able to maintain an 1.0 FTE to be housed within the SNCTC to gather information related to a potential biological attack or outbreak. SNHD is the lead agency for a public health incident within Clark County. This FTE will gather information related to any potential public health incidents or trends that may be occurring or emerging within the US or Internationally. The PHP Analyst is a partnership between LVMPD, Southern Nevada's other law enforcement agencies, and other community partner agencies housed in the SNCTC.
