1. **CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL** – Chair, Governor Steve Sisolak
2. **PUBLIC COMMENT**– (Discussion Only) – No action may be taken upon a matter raised under this item of the agenda until the matter itself has been specifically included on an agenda as an item upon which action may be taken. 3. **APPROVAL OF MINUTES** – (Discussion/For Possible Action) – Chair, Governor Steve Sisolak. The Commission will discuss and review the minutes of the March 7, 2022, Commission meeting. The Commission will determine whether to approve the meeting minutes.
4. **REPORT ON THE OFFICE OF CYBER DEFENSE COORDINATION ACTIVITIES** – (Discussion Only) - Shaun Rahmeyer, Administrator. The Commission will be provided a presentation on the activities of the Office of Cyber Defense Coordination, which includes, a briefing on the Office's statutory responsibilities, as well as, a description of its roles within the public safety community.
5. **REVIEW OF THE FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR (FFY) 2022 STATE HOMELAND SECURITY PROGRAM (SHSP) AND THE URBAN AREAS SECURITY INITIATIVE (UASI) PROGRAM RECOMMENDATIONS** – (Discussion/For Possible Action) – David Fogerson, State Administrative Agency (SAA) and Deputy Chief Billy Samuels, Urban Area Administrator

(UAA). The Commission will review and discuss the SHSP and the UASI funding recommendations submitted by the Nevada Resilience Advisory Commission (NRAC), the Urban Area Working Group (UAWG), and the Committee on Finance for the FFY 2022 Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP). Evaluation of all proposals, including additional recommendations of proposal allocations, may be conducted with the intent to vote on a final recommendation. HSGP project managers may be required to answer questions pertaining to their proposals. A list of the FFY 2022 project submissions will be provided in the meeting materials.

6. **STATUS OF HOMELAND SECURITY GRANTS PROGRAM (HSGP) FUNDS** – (Discussion Only) – David Fogerson, SAA, and Jared Franco, Division of Emergency Management/Homeland Security (DEM/HS). The Commission will be updated on the current status of all open FFY 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, and 2021 HSGP grants.
7. **NOTIFICATION OF REALLOCATION OF HOMELAND SECURITY GRANT PROGRAM (HSGP) FUNDS** – (Discussion Only) - David Fogerson, State Administrative Agency (SAA). This item will address both the Project Change Requests (PCR) and the re-obligation of funds for both the Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) and the HSGP funding streams. To ensure the use of the allocated federal funds, the SAA collaborated with the Urban Area Administrator (UAA) and made the approvals to use the de-obligated funds. A list of these projects will be included in the meeting materials.

1. CALL TO ORDER AND ROLL CALL

Governor Steve Sisolak called the meeting to order. Roll call was performed by Sherrean K. Whipple, Nevada Division of Emergency Management and Homeland Security (DEM/HS). Quorum was established for the meeting.

2. PUBLIC COMMENT

Governor Steve Sisolak opened the first period of public comment for discussion. No public comment was presented in written or verbal form during this agenda item.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Governor Steve Sisolak called for a motion to amend or amend and approve the draft minutes from the December 6, 2021, Nevada Commission on Homeland Security (Commission) meeting. Dr. Ikram Khan, Quality Care consultants, motioned to approve the minutes as presented. No discussion was presented. All were in favor with no opposition, and the motion passed unanimously.

4. NEVADA’S PREPAREDNESS ACTIVITIES RELATED TO RISING GEOPLITICAL TENSIONS

David Fogerson, Division of Emergency Management/Homeland Security (DEM/HS), explained that DEM/HS are watching the geopolitical tensions taking place across the world and their impact on Nevada. Mr. Fogerson described the establishment of a policy group that includes the Governor's Office and Directors of the main State Departments affected, and that this policy group is overseeing the State Emergency Operation Center. Mr. Fogerson explained that the group met last week at the State Emergency Operation Center to discuss possible scenarios and responses and intends to meet with local government emergency managers and major utility players to have these same discussions to ensure that the state is prepared rather than blindsided by any potential events moving forward.

5. HOMELAND SECURITY GRANT PROGRAM (HSGP) REPORTS FOR FEDERAL FISCAL YEARS, 17, 18, 19, 20, AND 21

David Fogerson, DEM/HS, informed the Commission that the packet includes reports from the grant program on the open grants for 2017, '18, '19, '20, and '21 to show how Homeland Security Enterprise dollars are being spent as well as the status of the different amounts. Mr. Fogerson explained that he and Chief Billy Samuels are working to ensure that two that are closing shortly are fully spent so that money does not remain on the table to be returned to the federal government. Mr. Fogerson further explained that no action is necessary but wanted to ensure transparency regarding the spending that is approved each year.

John Steinbeck commented that there appeared to be some very low percentages back into the 2018 grants and asked if there are any concerns regarding that spending.

David Fogerson explained that the Division is not yet concerned, given that with the de-obligated funds, the money will likely get spent due to the August 31, 2022 extension.

John Steinbeck asked if there are funds that have been de-obligated off of that percentage already, or if the amount showing is prior to de-obligations.

David Fogerson indicated that this amount was prior to de-obligation and was effective December 31. Since that time, DEM/HS has been working with partners on getting some of that money that will likely not be spent reallocated to other programs in need of the money that can spend it within the required timeframe.

6. REPORT ON THE STATEWIDE ADOPTION OF THE NATIONAL INCIDENT MANAGEMENT SYSTEM (NIMS)

Jon Bakkedahl, DEM/HS, informed the Commission that DEM/HS created a document the previous year that helped to focus everybody's efforts on what is being done at a statewide level with the Integrated Preparedness Plan and getting all the money guided and forwarded towards those support efforts. Mr. Bakkedahl explained that the bigger effort is actually on the Interstate Mutual Aid System (IMAS) with the tribal partners, who are allowed to opt into the system, four of whom have thus far: Pyramid Lake Paiute Tribe; Reno-Sparks Indian Colony; Yerington Paiute Tribe; and Las

Vegas Paiute Tribe. Mr. Bakkedahl explained that Nevada Tribal Emergency Coordinating Council (NTECC) employees are working with additional tribes to opt into the system for the benefit of all parties. Mr. Bakkedahl further explained that the Division is coordinating with Las Vegas Metro and other law-enforcement agencies for NIMS compliance to ensure eligibility for grant money moving forward. All of these efforts, Mr. Bakkedahl indicated, are continuing through the use of public information, technology, planning, training, and exercise.

7. RECOMMENDATION ON THE HOMELAND SECURITY ENTERPRISE PRIORITIES FOR THE FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR (FFY) 2022 HOMELAND SECURITY GRANT PROGRAM

David Fogerson, DEM/HS, explained that starting in 2017, the Division has been using a list of strategic capabilities to be maintained, and that this list included all the items that required State Homeland Security funds to continue. Mr. Fogerson reminded the Commission of discussions that had taken place at the previous year's meeting regarding transparency of this process and the need to minimize the risks to the state. Mr. Fogerson informed the Commission that a proposal with some adjustments was brought forward to the Nevada Resilience Advisory Committee (NRAC) and the Finance Committee, approved by both, and is now coming before this Commission for approval. Mr. Fogerson explained that the proposal is a true, enterprise-wide list of priorities rather than capabilities that includes unique Nevada programs such as the Nevada Threat Analysis Center and the Southern Nevada Counter Terrorism Center, among others, that must be maintained by these grant dollars. Mr. Fogerson explained that these have been renamed from capabilities to programs and listed in the proposal. In addition, Mr. Fogerson explained that public health has been included in the proposal as well as Homeland Security.

John Steinbeck asked David Fogerson if he has any indication of a notice of funding.

David Fogerson explained that this has not yet been released and is due out 60 days after the passing of the federal budget.

John Steinbeck asked David Fogerson if there are some promising programs on-deck that DEM/HS is looking to possibly fund this cycle that address some of the areas Mr. Fogerson identified.

David Fogerson explained that DEM/HS looks predominately to local government partners to bring forth programs that solve the problem on a local level as DEM/HS is limited to a number of investment justifications. Mr. Fogerson further explained that one of the big parts of this is that Homeland Security is in the state warehouse, storing the PPE stock for the next potential pandemic.

John Steinbeck discussed his belief that these are excellent ways to utilize some of this funding and indicated that when trying to address the risks of cyber and health, the magnitudes far exceed the available funding. As such, Mr. Steinbeck explained the need of the Commission to look at this as a crossover and requested that Chiefs Fogerson and Samuels continue to consult the Commission for assistance.

David Fogerson mentioned the new cybersecurity grant, informing the Commission that details at this time are scarce but forthcoming. Mr. Fogerson did indicate that there is \$220 million allocated for the first year among the 50 states, but it is not yet clear how much money will go to Nevada.

John Steinbeck indicated that throughout the pandemic, one of the biggest problems involved lack of personnel, particularly nurses, and as such, if there is a way to address some of those shortcomings as a state, a strategy is needed for that.

David Fogerson explained that some of this discussion gets into the point of policy dollars versus grant dollars, and that's where he'd like to see the document evolve in the future in order to fix some concerns with policy money going forward and save the grant money for other projects.

Charles Moore inquired about the fixes to harden the infrastructure in IT in terms of where the dollars should be assigned.

David Fogerson indicated that Shaun Rahmeyer, Office of Cyber Defense Coordination, could likely follow up next meeting on this inquiry.

Charles Moore indicated his support for this, explaining that he is interested in knowing what is lacking and what the fix would be.

Shaun Rahmeyer explained that there are certainly funding streams of which IT is aware and would like to take advantage but indicated that these are not going to be one-time fixes and as such, the state really should focus on a culture change and an increase in education across the boards: at the state level; at the local level; in the private sectors; and within communities across the state. Mr. Rahmeyer explained that there is much work going on behind the scenes to focus on efforts and programs to address these gaps and to find the funding to appropriately address them. Mr. Rahmeyer further indicated that his department will be working with DEM/HS and Chief Fogerson regarding the policy committee that will be stood up to further address the geopolitical tensions.

David Fogerson called for a motion to approve the recommendation on the Homeland Security Enterprise Priorities for the Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2022 Homeland Security Grant Program. John Steinbeck motioned to approve. No discussion was presented. All were in favor with no opposition, and the motion passed unanimously.

8. REVIEW OF THE 2021 ANNUAL REPORT FROM THE NEVADA RESILIENCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE (NRAC)

David Fogerson, DEM/HS, informed the Committee that their packet includes the 2021 NRAC report. Mr. Fogerson explained that NRS requires an annual report be created, submitted to legislature, submitted to the governor, and then submitted to the Homeland Security Commission. Mr. Fogerson then opened the floor to questions.

9. REVIEW OF THE 2021 ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE NEVADA COMMISSION ON HOMELAND SECURITY

David Fogerson, DEM/HS, explained that DEM/HS is required under NRS to produce a report on the activities of Homeland Security Commission, submit it to the legislature, submit it to the governor's office, and that the report has been included here for the Commission's review and questions.

10. PUBLIC COMMENT

Governor Steve Sisolak opened the second period of public comment for discussion. There was no public comment.

11. ADJOURN

Governor Steve Sisolak adjourned the meeting.

This project will continue to ensure a safe and secure environment by assisting law enforcement with rapid and confident analysis of potential chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear and explosive substances. This project will also enable the Regional Hazardous Materials Response Team to mitigate multiple hazardous materials events in the region when the need arises. Rapid identification of chemical weapons, highly toxic narcotics and explosives is critical to ensure that responders have a clear understanding of the threat at hand, whether an end product of precursor chemicals in a clandestine lab. It will also assist with the early identification and verification of substances for down range operations at multiple incidents.

The project is to enhance the response capabilities of the Triad Regional Response Team by adding monitoring equipment to a second mobile lab within the jurisdiction. Though not officially a "typed" team, the TRIAD strives to maintain the highest response level possible through planning, training, and appropriate equipment acquisition. With advancing technologies, many manufacturers stop supporting older analog technology which forces the purchase of new equipment. The project specifically addresses replacing various types of detection devices with different detection methods. This enables proper prevention, protection, mitigation, response, and recovery of risks within Washoe County and throughout the State.

There are numerous Tier II sites within the County, along major roadways, railways, airports, and the waterways including Lake Tahoe and the Truckee River that could potentially have a release that would cause a catastrophic impact on the community, population, and the environment. Schools and other facilities also have materials that require such equipment to detect and accurately identify. There are many different substances that fall into these categories that require specialized equipment to detect, identify, and provide vital information to responders, planners, officials, and the public. Hazmat release/chemicals are identified as a Threat of concern in the THIRA.

The TRIAD is an all-risk, non-typed, Regional HazMat Response Team for Washoe County that responds to all hazards including HazMat and CBRNE events. As the primary responder for the County, the TRIAD is responsible for highway, rail, air, and pipeline incidents. As the primary responders, the TRIAD coordinates with the Consolidated Bomb Squad and the Clear Team for regional support for protecting Washoe County's infrastructure against possible terrorist type activity.

The goal is the Washoe County Triad/ HazMat CBRNE is to provide updated equipment to a second mobile lab so they have the same capabilities. This will allow the team to mitigate two concurrent incidents at the same time safely, efficiently and effectively.

The Triad Regional Hazardous Materials Team is the primary responder for Washoe County. It consists of over 85 personnel from Reno FD, Sparks FD, and Truckee Meadows Fire Protection District, that is capable of responding outside of the county and still be able to handle a level I incident within the local jurisdiction. The Team regularly responds to incidents where hazmat/CBRNE is located. With the expanding call volume and the rapid changes in technology, the Triad is in need of upgrading equipment on mobile labs and increase training of personnel in the future.

With the increased threats against infrastructure, the increase transport of hazardous and CBRNE materials including radiological WIPP shipments, the increase in mass casualty incidents and the threats at special events, the Team is in need of this equipment to enhance the protection of the public and to coordinate with other local and State agencies as needed.

The CERT Program, as a project meets several of the FFY 2022 National Priorities. First and foremost the capabilities of the whole community to effectively implement locally executed, state-managed and federally supported outcome-driven sheltering . Shelter Management and deployment is a basic operational task of CERT in Douglas County. They do in fact, streamline evacuees progress through all phases, including populations with disabilities and other access and functional needs. Our program has been time tested with last year's devastating wildland fires within our jurisdiction. In the area of Public Health, the CERT Project, provided personnel to manage this logistical needs driven by naturally occurring infectious disease with public health and healthcare implications. Specifically, CERT, along with National Guard, Public Health professionals, and volunteer firefighters, managed numerous COVID-19 Testing and later vaccination events over a two year period. Operational Coordination and Communications Coordination was enhanced by CERT Program participation in Nevada Energy's Public Safety Outage Management events. CERT personnel were trained to assist with maintaining locations where impacted citizen gather to service cellular and computer devices, via charge stations. CERT additionally assisted with the deployment of COW's, (Cell On Wheels) units to allow for both cellular and internet connectivity at PSOM locations.

The CERT Program fills the gaps in Mass Care by providing a core team of volunteer personnel with specific training in Shelter Deployment and Management. It is a event proven and tested program in as much as our CERT program participate in three full shelter deployments in 2021. The CERT program will be a major contributor towards the THIRA identified need for Family Assistance Center/Reunification Center service within the Quad County areas of Nevada. The desire is to see this objective take place within the grant period. CERT has an opportunity, with appropriate training and exercising , to fill a critical void in support of the unthinkable circumstance of an act of terrorism with in our State.

Douglas County CERT has become an indispensable resource in our community and with in the region. While its main focus is intended to support a natural disaster, that capabilities and missions for our CERT program certainly would reinforce our response to a terrorism event. Our CERT program would be used to support the establishment of Family Assistance Centers and Reunification Centers. We are currently in the process of developing a regional program and procedures for these two critical needs. The effort, while being lead by public health professional at both the local and state level, has been collaborative with Emergency Management officials as well. Our CERT program is a function of our very robust Emergency Management services provided in Douglas County.

Our goal is the sustainment of the Douglas County CERT Program. Douglas County is one of a very small number of Nevada Counties that has a well-established CERT program. Not only is our program established, it has been event/incident tested numerous times since its existence . The project will be in direct support of the core capabilities identified in the IPPW. The CERT program and its members play a significant role in the pre-event phase of both large and small scale incident by recruiting members and training those recruited. CERT personnel provide protection by maintaining temporary communications capacity at NV Energy PSOM events. Under response, CERTs contribution are invaluable when it comes to evacuations and shelter deployment and operations. Last year alone, the Douglas County CERT opened and managed shelter facilities for both the Tamarack and Caldor Fires. Fires which had bi-state implications and required state to state coordination. Without CERT in Douglas County, the State of Nevada would not have been able to accommodate the

assistance request from both Alpine and Eldorado Counties in California. Under recovery, the Douglas County CERT program works to provide assistance and guidance to those who suffered losses. Working with the East Fork Fire Protection District, some CERT personnel participated in damage assessment, Douglas County CERT maintains capability in three geographic locations within Douglas County. The Carson Valley, Southern Douglas County, Lake Tahoe areas of Douglas County have CERT personnel available. Douglas County CERT is a resource which not only is available for multiple counties in Nevada, but also for our neighboring counties in California, as demonstrated last year. Sustainment funding is dedicated to the coordination of the program via a contracted coordinator, funding for training and equipping, membership recruitments, and background checks.

The East Fork Fire District is the contractor for Emergency Management in Douglas County. We have provided this service for over 15 years now under an interlocal contract. CERT falls under our duties and responsibilities for Emergency Management. Currently the CERT Program oversight is assigned to the Deputy Fire Chief/Fire Marshal and the Fire Prevention Division. All Deputy Fire Chiefs are also designated Deputy Emergency Managers for Douglas County. At the next level of management, a contract coordinator is engaged to manage the program, coordinates CERT volunteers, training, exercises, and general administration of the team. Under our program and contract, the District is able to attach training responsibilities to our dedicated Training and Safety Division as well. We also are able to provide the necessary clerical, financial, and support staff needed to manage a first class program. This has allowed Douglas County CERT to provide services beyond the fundamental program and expand into Shelter Management, Public Health emergency assistance with testing and vaccinations, Family Assistance Centers, EOC set up and support, incident rehabilitation for first responders, and volunteer assistance to local military veterans. We have additionally used CERT personnel with qualifications to assist with public information as managed by Douglas County Public Affairs personnel.

Bomb Squad capabilities through interdiction and disruption fits into addressing emerging threats FFY 2022 national priorities. The Elko Bomb Squad responds to WMD's, IED threats, suspicious items, actual IED's, and handles post blast investigation. This project would enhance our abilities to respond to these types of incidents.

This project goes hand in hand with the active shooter component of Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) and Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR). Bomb squad response to WMD's and active shooter incidents are essential to mitigate the threat of IED's at these incidents. This project will allow Elko Bomb Squad to have its response vehicle equipped with dismounted X-ray capabilities. The project will allow us to search and interrogate a large amount of suspicious items at incidents in a reasonable amount of time.

The NOFO stated that 5% of the funds will go to Addressing Emergent Threats, such as activities of Transnational Criminal Organizations, open source threats and threats from UAS and WMD. Elko Bomb Squad operations at WMD incidents falls under interdiction and disruption. Also Enhancing WMD and/or improvised explosive device (IED) prevention, detection, response and recovery capabilities is the core use for the equipment in our project. The stakeholders for the SHSP grant money will clearly be able to place this project under the IJ.

Yes, the threat of terrorist IED bombing on the homeland is a real threat. The Department of Homeland Security states that "A terrorist attack on the United States remains significant and pressing threat. Improvised explosive devices (IEDs) remain the terrorist weapon of choice due to their relative ease of construction, availability, and destructive capacity." the Elko Bomb Squad and the bomb squads across the state including our federal partners have the sole responsibility to mitigate these incidents.

This project would maintain and enhance the Elko Bomb Squad capabilities for x-ray interrogation and dismounted operations. The improvement of the digital x-ray technology allows the bomb squads to rapidly x-ray multiple devices with smaller amounts of pulses. This would allow teams deployed to move faster through an active shooter environment or WMD incident. If an IED was located the team would be able to render safe the IED through dismounted operations, faster, and more reliable than with our current equipment.

This project would allow the Elko Bomb Squad, Tahoe Douglas Bomb Squad, and Consolidated Bomb Squad to have the same capabilities. This would allow all three squads to work together in a mutual aid incident. Batteries would be interchangeable, dismounted teams would have continuity of equipment and the familiarity of the equipment would allow the team members to work together independent their squads. This would only enhance the interoperability of the 16 bomb technicians throughout the entire northern half of the State of NV and the rest of the state.

The Elko Bomb Squad has a core area of responsibility in Elko County, NV as well as our contract jurisdictions (Lander County, NV, White Pine County, NV, Eureka County, NV, Humboldt County, NV). The Elko Bomb Squad has also been

called upon to respond to incidents in the Reno/Sparks area through the Northern Nevada Bomb Technician Task Force and could also respond nationally as a FEMA Type 1 bomb squad.

This project enhances statewide resilience by providing continuity training and exercises to organizations/jurisdictions within the State of Nevada to ensure they are prepared and able to continue operations during and after a disaster.

This project is directly related to the top threats & hazards identified in the 2019 THIRA. These include terrorism, & All-Hazards that affect Nevada (THIRA p. 4-28). Each hazard has desired outcomes identified in the THIRA that rely on functioning governmental, and private sector, agencies to respond & lead recovery efforts. The SPR lists COOP/COG as a Planning Capability. COOP/COGs directly impact Economic Recovery and Health and Social Services Targets as identified on Page 10 of the SPR.

This project has been a priority of Nevada’s Resilience Commission (RC) since the initial 2009 Target Capability Assessment. The statewide summary level of preparedness for these plans was rated medium-low on the FEMA rating scale. The Nevada State Homeland Security Strategy places COOP/COG planning as an area of focus and it has remained a goal of the Resilience Commission.

Yes, this project is all about preventing the failure of government after a terrorism event (but it is applicable to all-hazards, of course). The initiative ensures orders of succession, alternate facilities, and devolution planning.

To sustain and maintain planning through continuity of operations (COOP) and continuity of government (COG) for agencies Statewide. This is a request to continue sustainment efforts and capabilities for this statewide project. During the initial phase of this project, plans were developed for Counties, Cities, and Tribes throughout Northern Nevada. During Phase 2 of the project, sustainment began with Northern Nevada local governments, while continuity plans were created for Clark County Metro to demonstrate the value of continuity plans for Southern Nevada terrorism preparedness, the City of Henderson, and the Moapa Tribe. The 3rd phase of the project completed additional State agencies and the City of Las Vegas. The 4th phase of the project focused on the UASI jurisdictions of Clark County, Clark County School District, and the Southern Nevada Health District; and continued the efforts to ensure that participants are trained to update plans, have access to planning tools, and refine continuity plans in the State of Nevada. The 5th phase added North Las Vegas and the University of Nevada, Reno. Phase 6 developed Elko County and UNLV COOP plans. Phase 7 added Truckee Meadows Community College (TMCC) and Southern Nevada College (SNC). Phase 8 included Las Vegas Paiute Tribe Health and Human Services (LVPT HHS) and Washoe County Human Services, Our Place Campus. Phase 9 will include Humboldt County and Carson City in addition to securing the continued use of the planning tool through September 2024. This phase will continue the project through the fiscal year 2024.

The outcome of the project is to assist two jurisdictions in the State of Nevada in completing and exercising their COOPs/COGs, through the utilization of webinars, workshops, and tabletop exercises hosted by vendors. The users and beneficiaries of this capability will be Carson City and Humboldt County. The project enhances resilience for both jurisdictions and the State as a whole.

The project will be implemented by Washoe County Emergency Management (WCEM) via the use of vendors. WCEM will utilize vendors to provide webinars and training/workshops to complete COOP/COGs, as well as to conduct a tabletop exercise to test those plans prior to the completion of the project. The COOP/COGs will be “graded” for completion by a vendor, and an after-action improvement plan will be provided following the exercise.

In addition to sustaining the Statewide Steering Committee consisting of key stakeholders from state, local, rural, tribes, urban,

public jurisdictions, and the private sector (these are the administrators of the existing continuity plans); plans will be developed for one additional rural Nevada agency and one additional urban Nevada agency. When selecting this year's COOP planning vendor, additional tasks will be included in the Scope of Work (SOW). Training will be provided to one rural Nevada and one urban Nevada agency to assist them in bringing their COOP plans online. Plans-writers will work one-on-one with jurisdictions and agencies to update and sustain the plans to ensure that they are successful. The collaborative website of NevadaContinuity.com will be continued along with a web-based COOP planning tool for resources. Continuity of Operations tabletop exercises will be held in two locations around the State to train and test the completed COOP/COG plans. Best practices and the FEMA 2018 Continuity Guidance Circular dated February 2018 (which mentioned this initiative as a best practice on p.34) are being integrated into the plans, and outreach efforts conducted throughout the State. Enhancing the protection of Soft Targets / Crowded places – The requested side-by-side, transport trailer, and response trailer will allow the bomb squad to effectively transport equipment and personnel at special events and crowded places. The requested upgrade to the single vent transport trailer will allow us to safely move a suspicious device out of a crowded event and to a safe area for render safe procedures.

Combating Domestic Violent Extremism - The requested travel and training funds will be used to expand our capabilities in response to military ordnance. Military ordnance is a common source of high explosives found in improvised explosive devices, like those used by extremist's groups. The requested under door camera allows the bomb technician to safely and effectively clear thresholds of booby traps, which is another common tactic used by extremist's groups.

Enhancing Election security – On election day, the Consolidated Bomb Squad completes sweeps of the election office. With the requested response trailer, it would allow us to strategically pre-stage equipment throughout the community. Prestaging equipment allows us to respond to suspicious packages or unattended packages at polling locations in a timelier manner.

The Consolidated Bomb Squad is used in response to credible threats to conduct screening, search and detection operations of packages or items that could contain possible improvised explosive devices. The requested equipment would allow us to respond to suspected improvised explosive devices and conduct remote and render safe operations. The equipment would expand our capability to integrate bomb technicians into a tactical environment such as an active shooter type event as well as threats to special events, crowded places and election infrastructure and polling locations.

The Consolidated Bomb Squad is responsible for responding to explosive devices and suspicious packages and rendering safe these devices. Explosive devices have been favored by terrorist groups to cause large areas of geographic damage, as well as significant death tolls and casualties to further their terrorist ideology. Explosives have been possessed or used in the greater Northern Nevada area by persons associated with sovereign citizens or terrorist groups.

The Consolidated Bomb Squad (CBS) based in Reno, NV covers an area of responsibility of over 27,500 square miles consisting of Humboldt, Pershing, Churchill, Storey counties, and the 2nd most populated county in the state, Washoe County. The CBS is part of a Federal Task Force that responds to all of Nevada and includes a small area in California. Our project outcome is to maintain and improve our operational effectiveness and expand our dismounted operational capabilities. The CBS provides bomb technicians and explosives detection canines for all requested special events within the state of Nevada. These special events include Hot August Nights, Air Races, UNR Sporting events and Burning Man to name a few. All these events are soft targets that draw crowds of up to 80,000 participants.

The requested side-by-side and trailers will allow equipment to rapidly be deployed at special events. Currently the CBS

deploys a large response vehicle at these events. This vehicle is too large to move through large crowds of people. If bomb squad equipment is needed to respond to an unattended or suspicious package left within the event, we are required to hand carry equipment. This slows our response. With the requested response trailer and side-by-side we will be able to store needed equipment closer to the special event venues and more effectively deploy required equipment.

The CBS responds to 20-50 call outs per year. Many of these calls for service involve found or modified military ordnance. The proper identification of military ordnance is key to implementing required safety guidelines and providing proper identification to our military partners. The requested travel and training will provide two bomb technicians with advanced military ordnance recognition skills. This training will ensure that all proper precautions are taken in our response to these calls for service.

Regarding intelligence and information sharing, part of the monitoring service includes notification of malicious attempts to access the network.

The goal of this project is to increase and to maintain the cybersecurity of county-based voter registration systems through the monitoring of an Intrusion Detection System (IDS), including netflow monitoring, of election system networks in the following Nevada counties: Churchill, Elko, Esmeralda, Eureka, Humboldt, Lander, Lincoln, Mineral, Nye, Pershing, Storey, and White Pine. The remaining five Nevada counties (Douglas, Lyon, Carson City, Washoe, and Clark) already have IDS and netflow monitoring and analysis available to them through funding provided by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS). IDS and netflow monitoring and analysis provide local governments with a near real-time automated process that identifies and alerts on traditional and advanced threats on a network, facilitating rapid response to cyber threats and attacks. IDS and netflow monitoring and analysis will enhance the cybersecurity capability of the Nevada's smallest counties as it relates to elections. Nevada is what is known as a "bottom-up" state, which means that each county election office maintains its own voter registration database. The ability to provide real-time intelligence in the

furtherance of on-going investigations is paramount to a timely and comprehensive intervention. The ability for a regional hub to combine data and resources from three large metropolitan areas is invaluable to the resources on the street. The communities of Elko County and the surrounding areas face a number of significant threats to their residents and critical infrastructure. These threats, such as terrorism, natural disasters and violent crime require our first responders to be constantly prepared for any critical incidents that may occur in the area. The extensive flooding that impacted both the City of Elko and the entire county in February of 2017, which damaged and closed roads and forced some local residents to be evacuated, shows the severity of the threats facing the region.

To better help prepare for such incidents, our local law enforcement departments work together to sustain the highly trained Elko Special Response Team (ESRT) to respond to all high risk critical call outs that occur within the county. In order for the team to effectively carry out our mission to protect the citizens and critical infrastructure of the region, we must have sufficient equipment to do the job. At this time, however, we lack access to a vehicle capable of meeting our needs for responding to catastrophic incidents such as natural disasters and terrorist attacks, performing rescues and evacuations in adverse conditions, or for protecting the team and civilians from ballistic attacks.

As the ESRT is responsible for responding to all incidents that exceed the capability of patrol within our jurisdiction, including terrorist attacks, hostage situations and mass shooting incidents, we hereby request \$475,580.00 in funding to purchase a tactical multipurpose Response and Rescue Vehicle.

This vehicle offers hardened walls and blast proof windows allowing our team to deploy directly into hot zones to respond to ongoing emergencies. The vehicle offers 4-wheel drive capability, run flat tires, and the potential to reach highway speeds, helping us to respond to calls throughout our entire jurisdiction quickly in all road conditions. These capabilities will allow us to work off road when responding to calls in rural and remote areas of the county, while still allowing us to respond quickly to incidents taking place within in the City of Elko's more densely populated neighborhoods. The off-road capabilities will enable us to maneuver over road debris in the aftermath of natural disasters such as wildfires and flash floods and to navigate flood prone roadways in communities located along the Humboldt River or any of the area's numerous other waterways. The vehicle can carry up to 12 operators in full tactical gear and can fit up to 20 civilians in need of rescue or evacuation from violent incidents or natural disasters.

In addition to the vehicle's rugged body and durable tires, it also includes several other features that will help our SRT team members perform their duty. This includes two remote control spotlights that are capable of providing lighting in darkened areas and assisting us in search and rescue operations as well as a 4-way camera can be attached to the hydraulic ram to penetrate barricaded structures. This will allow the team to see inside barricaded areas to make sure there is no threat to officers, suspects, or hostages before attempting an entry.

In addition to protecting officers and civilians from ballistic attacks, a Rescue and Response Vehicle will increase cooperative efforts with other area first responders, improving our ability to respond to terrorist attacks, natural disasters, or other mass casualty events. The vehicle's various features will also allow us to work with paramedics and area fire units in performing rescues in adverse conditions, such as during flooding events when standard emergency response vehicles are not able to deploy due to their low ground clearance, or in the aftermath of wildfires or other natural disasters when our area's fire trucks and ambulances are not able to access affected areas due to debris or damaged roadways.

Recent terrorist attacks in the United States have involved individuals carrying out mass shootings in crowded areas, the ability to utilize a vehicle capable of protecting officers and civilians from ballistic attacks could not be more important to Law Enforcement Terrorism Prevention (LETP) efforts. Additionally, the vehicle can also support LETP efforts by acting as a mobile means of target hardening. Due to its many protective features, the vehicle can be used to protect outdoor events from the type of vehicle-based attacks that have been seen both domestically and internationally over the past several years. As such, terrorist incidents can be the work of either individual domestic extremists or larger organizations, these LETP capabilities can be used to combat lone wolf attacks as well as to disrupt Complex Coordinated Terrorist Attacks (CCTAs)

We have chosen this investment both because it improves the effectiveness and the safety of our tactical unit and because it

is cost effective. The lives of first responders, innocent civilians and even violent suspects are priceless and protecting them is our highest priority. This vehicle will reduce liability, enhance capability, and expand rescue options, allowing us to minimize personal injury and property damage.

The ESRT has jurisdiction throughout the entirety of Elko County, a 17,203 square mile region with a growing population of 53,702 residents. This leaves us responsible for performing operations in both the smaller municipalities and unincorporated communities of the county, as well as within larger municipalities such as the City of Elko (17.86 square miles with 20,564 residents). Through mutual aid agreement, the team also performs tactical operations within Lander, White Pine and Eureka Counties. In addition to the counties previously mentioned, the ESRT also routinely partners with Washoe County during major events such as motorcycle rallies etc. in an effort to offer aid and support.

There are numerous examples of critical infrastructure, soft targets, and crowded places in and around Elko County that this vehicle could protect from terrorist attacks or other threats. This includes:

- Great Basin Community College has 3,836 students on a 44 acre campus.
- Elko County is home to 33 schools, with 7 high schools, 8 middle schools, 14 elementary schools, 2 alternative schools, 1 charter school, and 1 private school.
- Northeastern Nevada Regional Hospital is a 59 bed facility with an ER and radiology equipment.
- Elko Regional Airport is a 700 acre facility with 2 runways that serves commercial passenger flights.
- There are numerous gold mines within the Elko area, with mining serving as the county's top industry.
- The Carlin Tunnel is a .3 mile long structure with 4 tubes that serves train lines and 10,000 vehicles per day.
- I-80 crosses the region with 34 separate exits located within the Elko County, Eureka County, Lander County area.

The ESRT has been involved in numerous high-risk call outs that show this jurisdiction's vulnerability. This includes a number of barricaded gunman and hostage incidents that forced the team to approach isolated buildings and to engage in prolonged standoffs with armed individuals, including two incidents in 2021 where the suspects involved in the standoffs had fired their weapons, as well as an incident from June 2021 where the team was called in after a homicide suspect had fired on state workers while driving through a construction zone and then led law enforcement on a pursuit before crashing his car. The team responded to another incident in March 2020 in White Pine County after a gunman shot and killed a Nevada Highway Patrolman, burned his body at the scene and fled the scene with his state patrol vehicle. The team apprehended the suspect in a rural area of Nevada and collaborated with agencies from Las Vegas to help process the crime scene. During this particular incident, an MRAP was used in the apprehension; however, it was less than ideal given the very soft, uneven terrain the suspect fled to. Such events show the need for our area to obtain a rescue vehicle that offers protection from ballistic and explosive threats and 4-wheel drive capability in order to protect our operators and civilians during all incidents.

The City of Elko suffers from a high violent crime rate and the entire county lies in a region that is considered "Relatively High Risk for Wildfires" (FEMA National Risk Index- January 2022). Despite these facts, the only vehicle the team has access to when performing tactical operations is a military surplus MRAP. With the acquisition of a Rescue and Response Vehicle, the ESRT will be better equipped to handle calls throughout our jurisdiction and will have better protection to help prepare us for any type of attack that may occur within the region. With the safety provided by the truck's hardened walls and windows we will be able enter hot zones to rescue civilians and increase the likelihood of a quick and positive resolution to incidents, while also being better prepared to assist our fellow first responders by performing rescues and evacuations in the immediate aftermath of natural disasters in areas that may be inaccessible using standard equipment.

Multiple federal government agencies have complimented the effectiveness of this type of vehicle in responding to critical incidents. They affirm its capability to protect responding personnel and citizenry during HazMat and mass casualty incidents. Furthermore, these agencies and law enforcement agencies throughout the country currently use these vehicles as a key tool to prevent acts of terrorism. The Elko Special Response Team needs this equipment so that we can continue to protect against, mitigate the effects of, respond to and recover from terrorism and natural disasters. This investment will increase integration among first responders allowing us to protect against the widest variety of hazards so that we can fulfill our duty to safeguard our immediate and surround

11. Describe the investment or project, specifically how it addresses gaps and/or sustainment in the Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA)/Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR).

This project directly correlates to the five mission areas of the National Preparedness Goal: Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response and Recovery.

The current capabilities of the ESRT to respond to the vast rural areas located in Elko County during a time of an emergency, whether terroristic or natural disaster, have been severely limited by the vehicle available to the ESRT- a surplus issued MRAP. While this vehicle does offer protection from most ballistic threats, the MRAP's size and low speed prevent it from being used on many operations, as it is too heavy to cross a number of bridges or travel on dirt roads in our rural communities and too slow to respond to emergencies that might occur in areas hundreds of miles from where the vehicle is stationed. The MRAP also suffers from frequent mechanical issues that force it to be sent to specialized facilities for maintenance that can be both very expensive and very time consuming, due to the rarity of the parts required for the vehicle, which can leave our team without effective protection during operations, placing both our operators and civilians at risk during critical incidents.

The acquisition of a Rescue and Response Vehicle will significantly increase the response and recovery times of both civilians and officers in any situation. In addition to facilitating a better response and recovery operation, obtaining a Rescue and Response Vehicle offers maneuverability previously unattainable through the use of an MRAP. This will enable the ESRT to better prevent and/or stop a terroristic threat or direct threat to the community faster than previously able to. A Rescue and Response Vehicle offers protection for officers and civilians alike with the capability to hold up to 14 fully equipped operators

or 20 civilians. The maneuverability aspect will enable the ESRT to reach locations previously unattainable by the use of an MRAP due to its high ground clearance, lighter weight and greater visibility and allow the safe insertion and evacuation of operators during high risk scenarios.

Bottom line, the current use of an MRAP delays response times and can only be deployed to certain areas that can handle its weight and roll radius, this is a gap in capabilities for the ESRT. By purchasing a Rescue and Response Vehicle, the ESRT can significantly increase its response time to incidents in both Elko County and surrounding counties while prioritizing safety for both officers and civilians.

12. Please explain your project's nexus to terrorism.

The City of Elko is in a unique location in the state. Sitting in the northeastern corner of the state, it is bisected by I-80 in addition to having Highway 93 run north and south just 50 miles east in the town of Wells. Elko is home to a regional airport and a regional hospital as well as the largest gold mining complex in the world, Nevada Gold Mines. Elko's location and transportation roadways makes it vulnerable to the possibility of the transportation of both biological and chemical weapons. In 2019 a train derailment caused a two day shut down of the railway due to military ordinance being aboard the train. For this incident, both the ESRT and Elko Bomb Squad responded to secure the scene until state and federal officials arrived the take possession of the ordinance. This incident highlighted the fragility of the railway system and the vulnerability of the transportation system in Elko County. In addition to roadways and transportations systems, the vast square mileage of Elko County leaves acres upon acres of land unvisited, making it a prime location for extremists, both foreign and domestic, to develop plans and create weaponry to carry out an attack.

With the light weight, off road capability, along with the safety provided by a Rescue and Response Vehicle's hardened walls and windows we will be able enter hot zones to protect our officers, rescue civilians and increase the likelihood of a quick and positive resolution to incidents, while also being better prepared to assist our fellow first responders by performing rescues and evacuations in the immediate aftermath of an attack.

The ESRT often partners with the Elko Bomb Squad with four bomb technicians dual trained as ESRT operators, one of the few tactical/rescue teams in the country to utilize and combine these resources. The acquisition of a Rescue and Response Vehicle would also be at the disposal of the Elko Bomb Squad should they need to use it for civilian evacuation, additional armor, blast protectant, etc.

The project outcome would be to secure a Rescue and Response Vehicle fully funded through the HSGP grant. With 75% of the ESRT's critical response locations in rural areas of the county, a Rescue and Response Vehicle is a much more practical choice for transportation. The procurement of a Rescue and Response Vehicle would enable the ESRT to reach critical scenes sooner with more fully equipped operators on board as opposed to the ESRT's current means for transportation. Sometimes traveling hundreds of miles to scenes, the current mode of transportation (MRAP) is unable to reach highway speeds and often delays response time for the ESRT, wasting precious time when responding to situations of active shooters, homicide suspects at large or civilians trapped in natural disasters (such as the catastrophic flood in 2017).

The ESRT has a core area of responsibility in Elko County, NV but often responds to the neighboring counties of Lander County, NV, White Pine County, NV, Eureka County, NV, and Humboldt County, NV pursuant to current MOUs. The ESRT has also been called to assist in incidents in the Reno/Sparks area.

In addition to providing superior protection and off road capabilities, a Rescue and Response Vehicle is far more low profile than an MRAP. In the current time of policing, it is imperative to underscore law enforcement in the capacity for which they serve, the citizens, as opposed to appearing as a more militarized organization. While the MRAP does provide armor benefits, it is also very apparent that it is a military surplus vehicle, making it hard for citizens to separate the militarization of the police department. The ESRT would benefit from a Rescue and Response Vehicle as a lower profile rescue vehicle as opposed to a military vehicle such as the MRAP. This is an opportunity to foster better community relations and possibly prevent situations such as riots or opposition to law enforcement due to the appearance of a militarized force.

ESRT operators will be trained on how to operate the vehicle and will be signed off accordingly to maintain training records for the vehicle.

The Animal Shelter Trailers project fits into the FFY 2022 National Priority under "enhancing community preparedness and resilience" via community resilience and catastrophic disaster housing. This project falls under the core capability of "mass care services." This project enhances community resilience by providing animal shelter trailers during evacuation and sheltering. In the absence of a shelter location that allows animals, these temperature-controlled trailers can be set up next to the human shelter to maintain proximity and care for pets. This was identified as a significant gap in the Caldor Fire

This project will provide the region with the ability to shelter animals in a mobile capacity in response to any hazard, including terrorism.

The outcome of this project is to purchase two, 7' x 19' trailers, that are self-contained and temperature controlled to house animals during emergencies. At the evacuation shelter, Washoe County Regional Animal Services (WCRAS) staff and volunteers are charged with locating an area to set up the emergency animal shelter with all necessary supplies. This can take an exorbitant amount of time to do, depending on how many staff are available to respond and how far the location is from the supply trailer. These two emergency animal trailers are self-contained, and temperature controlled to expand and broaden our emergency response capabilities. These emergency animal trailers will each house up to 22 adult animals and provide immediate housing needs in an emergency. The trailers will provide more flexibility for animals and people to be housed within proximity together, as some emergency human shelters do not permit animals inside. These trailers will drastically improve the response time to set up emergency shelters as well as streamline the workflows once we are set up in an emergency setting. These trailers may also be a useful tool for other jurisdictions during emergencies as well.

The capability of community preparedness and resilience will be achieved by ensuring we are resilient in keeping animals safe. The beneficiaries of this capability are anyone in an evacuation/shelter zone with animals that need to be evacuated. This project will benefit all citizens of Washoe County and the neighboring jurisdictions in the region.

These trailers are similar to the one purchased by the City of Henderson through HSGP. They are different in that as opposed to one big trailer requiring a special license to tow, these are two smaller trailers that only require a standard Class C license to tow.

This project will enhance community preparedness and resilience by improving transparency between law enforcement and community members, providing opportunity to de-escalate threatening situations by the presence of a recording device on law enforcement and our community service officers. Should a harmful event occur, RapidStop tourniquets would allow officers to respond and save lives when time is critical to an injury. Transparency between law enforcement and the community builds trust and increases community resilience when events occur. These are measure to improve on-scene protection and law enforcement to prevent threats and preserve lives in the event of an attack.

This project aims to improve officer and community safety by equipping police officers with up-to-date body worn cameras and life saving tourniquets. Active shooters and mass casualty attacks are listed in the 2021 THIRA as two of the largest threats to the region. This project can help close the gap on public health and emergency healthcare through use of law enforcement employed tourniquets following a mass casualty attack. Body worn cameras protect the community and officers from active threats by incorporating an objective, evidence collecting device that can help de-escalate a high stress situation, as well as through improving community trust and transparency.

This project allows our agency to prevent, protect, mitigate and respond to acts of terrorism and other threats in a way that potentially keeps officers safer and community members safer. The materials requested help to de-escalate potentially violent confrontations, provide objective evidence, and provide life saving healthcare that all relate to terrorism and other threats. With the increase in school shootings in recent years, preparing our officers for any threat is critical to the safety of our campuses and surrounding communities.

The last few years has brought sharp focus to the cybersecurity risks and vulnerability of our Nations critical infrastructure and the active need to assess and continue to improve and protect these systems and the functions they support. Nye County has also been actively focused on improving our Cybersecurity posture for the local, State, and collective benefit as Cybersecurity is one of the biggest risks to our National Security and resiliency.

This Cybersecurity project is intended to build and develop an enterprise cybersecurity program within Nye County that directly fits into many of the priorities identified in both the FFY 2022 State and National priorities and is focused on closer aligning us with NIST standards.

The project's focus will be to conduct a data discovery and comprehensive systems security assessment, process flow discovery, a detailed security controls analysis and a risk assessment for the systems and processes that store or process sensitive information. A controls assessment - gap analysis and best practice review and followed by remediation of the assessment findings, including a cyber resilience review for ransomware impact and recovery, and followed up by comprehensive internal and external Penetration (PEN) testing conducted to validate control and vulnerability exposure.

The gap analysis will determine the status of our environment in terms of security posture and will use the controls from the standard cybersecurity process steps to Identify, Protect, Detect, Respond and Recover in the NIST Framework. This will be used to find technical controls already in place and research the desired state of controls to create needed security policies as part of the project.

Within this project is time committed towards performing a Business Impact Assessment (BIA) for identifying and prioritizing IT systems and correlating them with business processes to determine impact and criticality if the systems were unavailable. This will determine, and document business processes in relation to the supporting IT systems and classify recovery criticality including Maximum Tolerable Downtime (MTD), Recovery Time Objective (RTO), and Recovery Point Objective (RPO).

Cyber-attacks have advanced from limited resource individuals looking for targets of opportunity to advanced, distributed, staged and even State sponsored sophisticated attacks that have been shown to have the ability to incapacitate, damage or destroy critical infrastructure. These attacks, if not mitigated thru continuing advancements in security processes, tools and techniques, can render the agencies that rely on these systems to provide services to the public unable to complete their mission and can cause direct risk to life safety for agency personnel and compromise their ability to mitigate and investigate other forms of terrorism for the protection of the public.

These changes have resulted in the understanding that physical terrorism is not the only concern to the health and safety of the public, the threat of cyberattack impacting infrastructure has become a daily occurrence and continues to be on an upward trend.

Many of the services provided by Government have become high profile targets and the cyber-defense of these targets has become of high importance to our State and Nation.

The project will encompass:

The Special Operations Division response truck project request has several overlaps between the national priorities.

Enhancing the protection of Soft Targets / Crowded places – The Washoe County Sheriff's Office Special Operations Division houses several entities that participate in the protection of soft targets and crowded places. Our Search and rescue volunteers provide crowd control, the Special Weapons and Tactics provide tactical response, the aviation unit provides overwatch and real-time intelligence, and our bomb squad provides protective sweeps and IED response. This truck will be used to transport equipment and tow needed trailers that support these specialized teams.

Combating Domestic Violent Extremism – The Washoe County Sheriff's Office Bomb squad and Special Weapons and Tactics Team have responded to situations involving those involved in extremists' groups. This could include transporting a trailer containing robots for the bomb squad or pulling a fuel trailer required for the helicopter when utilized for the transport of SWAT team members to and from the location of a terrorist event.

One of the exercise's objectives will exercise the gap identified in the THIRA by "within 30 minutes of the identification or notification of a credible threat, identify/ analyze local context of the threat for the respective area of responsibility, and facilitate the sharing of threat information with 15 priority intelligence stakeholder agencies/ entities in accordance with the intelligence cycle and all dissemination protocols."

4) Public Health, Healthcare, and Emergency Medical Services. One exercise objective will partially address the completion of triage and initiation of care for a large group of people requiring Emergency Medical Services.

As that State of NV continues to enhance and grow its response capabilities, all of our training, exercise, and other preparedness projects are tied to known or perceived threats of terrorism. This project will allow state, local, tribal, federal, private sector, and Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster (VOAD) partners to plan for, prepare for, mitigate against, respond to, and/ or recover from the effects of a terrorist incident. The exercise scenario will center around a terrorist attack on a mass gathering event that exercises the following capabilities: Mass Casualty response, Mass Fatality response, a Hazardous Materials assessment, an intelligence and information gathering response, among others. This project aims to improve protection of soft targets/crowded places by improving training for local law enforcement to better equip them for active shooters, acts terrorisms and other threats to our campuses. With 6 higher education institutions in our jurisdiction, and with the constant threat of active shooters on school campuses, ensuring that our officers are best equipped to respond to threats is critical to our community's safety.

The 2021 THIRA lists active shooters as one of the biggest threats to our region, along with mass casualty attacks. Our campuses serve more than 50,000 students, employees and community members. School shootings, and active shooters at places of large gatherings are a nationwide threat today. This project aims to improve physical protective measures through preparation and training of law enforcement officers in the region for the many threatening scenarios that they may encounter. Increasing their exposure and experience with terrorism scenarios, active shooter scenarios, and many other threats through an adaptable and realistic method of training will better prepare officers to protect our communities and keep people safe. The project would fund a simulation training system than required less personnel resources and more realistic and varying scenarios than are currently available in our agency.

This project aims to better prepare law enforcement officers to respond to acts of terrorism, active shooters, and other threats to our campus communities through improved and varied training scenarios. This preparation project directly ties to training for response to acts of terrorism so that our law enforcement officers are ready for any threat.

This project aims to better prepare law enforcement officers to respond to acts of terrorism, active shooters, and other threats to our campus communities through improved and varied training scenarios. The core capability that this project addresses is On-Scene Security, Protection, and Law Enforcement. Through simulation training, officers can practice responding to real life scenarios, gain insights and review analytics to improve their real life on scene security and protection of our communities. Our officers, community service officers and some community members will use the training system. This project will benefit the state of Nevada as a whole by preparing officers to prevent and respond to threats. University Police Department, Northern Command has campuses and facilities across Nevada, creating a jurisdiction that spans the state. Training our officers means their expertise is working to keep the entire state as safe as possible. The focus of this project is statewide with a focus on Northern Nevada.

The proposed target hardening activity will enhance protection of Truckee Meadows Community College, its assets, and all persons using TMCC facilities through the installation of a physical security access control and identity verification system.

11. Describe the investment or project, specifically how it addresses gaps and/or sustainment in the Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA)/Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR).

This question is specifically asked in the Investment Justification.

The project will address the Access Controls and Identity Verification and Physical Protective Measures capability targets in the 2021 THIRA by greatly enhancing physical protection of TMCC, its assets, and all persons using TMCC facilities by installing an access control and verification system for all campus facilities. The Nevada THIRA/SPR addresses COVID-19, active shooters, and wildfires as three threats of the greatest concern to the state. Improving access controls will allow tracking of lock access and the ability to lock down the facility more efficiently in the event of an active school shooter, reducing standardized impacts of the number of people affected and potential fatalities. Additionally, TMCC is available as an evacuation and emergency center in the event of terrorism, wildfire, or other extreme circumstance and was activated as an Incident Command Center for COVID-19 response. Providing new locks to TMCC will allow for reducing the following standardized impacts of the threat of COVID19: people affected and potential fatalities. Allowing a secure location to isolate and/or receive medical care in the event of an emergency like the COVID19 pandemic can reduce the impact of the threat by limiting the number of people affected from exposure or lack of medical treatment.

This project will address capability gaps in all POETE areas. A new system and procedures will be mapped and planned dependent on potential funding awarded, personnel will be hired to install the proper system, addressing any organization gap, and new equipment will be acquired for continued use and maintenance, addressing any equipment gap. Additionally, a capability gap is the need for training, as well as procedures for a new system. TMCC administration will undergo training from the selected vendor once a specific system is selected. They will then develop written procedures and protocol for the system, and provide ongoing training to TMCC staff, closing any training and exercises gaps in the SPR. TMCC is a vital part of NSHE and the northern Nevada community. Protecting all persons and property within these facilities, as well as maintaining a safe and secure evacuation location is critical to the area's safety, sustainability and economic health.

TMCC is populated daily by members of our community, and is available as needed as an emergency location in the event of terrorism or other disaster. Increasing security and improving access control, allowing this location to serve as a safe and secure evacuation center would benefit the entire state of Nevada by serving as a resource and protecting our community. Most importantly, improving access controls and verification protects students, staff and other community members from the increased threat of active shooters on school campuses and other mass casualty attacks.

The goal of the proposed project is to install access controls and an identity verification system for all TMCC facilities in order to improve physical security, keep people and assets safe, and to be a reliable emergency location for the area. The proposed target-hardening activity will address the capability of Access Controls and Identity Verification by installing a new access and

identity control/verification key system for all Truckee Meadows Community College campus facilities. The system will use a form of key card electronic access allowing for the tracking of building access on a minimum of 300 access points. The system will provide the ability to allow and restrict access electronically, instead of changing physical locks and replacing standard keys, a slow and costly process. The users and beneficiaries of this project are the staff and students of this higher education institution, citizens of the surrounding community, and the state of Nevada as a whole. The campus is vital to the health of the community and is available as an evacuation and emergency center in the event of terrorism or extreme circumstance. This project aims to improve safety of campus occupants in the event of an active shooter or other threat. The campus is located in Reno, NV, the most populated northern Nevada city, and having it serve as a safe and secure community location/evacuation center would benefit the entire state of Nevada by serving as a resource for and/or protecting our community.

The program meets both the THIRA and the SPR standards by annually conducting over 35 training classes and training over 500 people. The program also attends over 15 community events and talks to people about how to prepare, and how preparation can help them survive. CERT used to have a dedicated funding stream in Citizen Corp. The guidance for UASI indicates that these programs now be included in these funding streams.

The purpose of this grant application is to sustain and maintain the ability to provide operational capability allowing screening, search and detection capabilities to the ARMOR operators within the Las Vegas Urban Area (LVMPD, HPD, and NLVPD). The equipment requested maintains the ability to provide for the safety and security of operators in a CBRNE environment. The technology and equipment support requested is specifically designed for operations on WMD/CBRNE incidents and providing for CBRNE technology, monitoring and mitigation of potentially hazardous devices and structures

The THIRA/SPR identified Screening, Search and Detection as a high priority for the UASI area. The identification of chemical and biological agents within an hour of a noticeable threat was the standard set to meet the target. The ARMOR Task Force is the only law enforcement first responders with the capability to use high technology equipment to detect and assess threats that are occurring. Emerging threats have shown that biohazards and synthetic opioid responses have increased for law enforcement agencies.

The lightweight chemical detectors are the minimum equipment needed for responders to detect and identify chemical warfare agents and toxic industrial chemicals. The chemical detectors allow real time monitoring and identification of CWAs and TICs during operations and dignitary sweeps.

The warranties and high technology equipment employed by the ARMOR unit is utilized with a variety of tools for screening, search and detection of CBRNE threats and have been identified in the THIRA as being a high priority. By maintaining the efficiency and effectiveness of this capability, ARMOR will maintain the deployment capability to a multi-threat environment to provide real-time intelligence and information to Incident Commanders and support agencies. The warranties will be projected to ensure the technological capability of the Mobile ARIS, SAMpacks, First Defender, Gemini, TruDefender, Hazmat ID Elite, MX908, FTIR Spectrometer, IR Microscope, and XRF depending on allocation of funding available and requirements.

These projects are a high priority to the Las Vegas Urban Area since the ARMOR Task Force is the only organization that can provide tactical CBRNE support to area first responders.

Enhancing the protection of all places in Las Vegas and surrounding areas (soft targets/crowded places) by increasing our ability of collection, exploitation, processing, analysis, production, dissemination, and evaluation will provide timely, accurate, and actionable information. The exchange of intelligence, information, data, and/or knowledge gained by this equipment is critical for our community.

This investment will assist in the coordinated and unified approach of multiple agencies in the Las Vegas Urban Area to address multiple hazards from both natural and man-made threats. The agency will be able to provide the Unified Command with accurate and timely information utilizing the multiple technology approach to assist the Incident Command in allocating the proper resources to effectively and efficiently mitigate the hazard.

The THIRA listing for Intelligence and Information Sharing Core Capability under Threat/Hazard for both Active Shooter and Hazmat – Bomb Squad/Explosive Team “Timely sharing of accurate and timely intelligence and information with the Las Vegas Urban Area stakeholders and national stakeholders.”

The technology listed in this investment will provide the responding agencies of local, state, and federal responsibility with the best possible information and intelligence within the least amount of time, while utilizing a coordinated gathering technique that does not overload the responsibility on any one particular agency.

In meeting the THIRA, the equipment being purchased by the Las Vegas Fire & Rescue Arson/Bomb Squad will allow the efficient and effective coordination of response and information gathering to provide an accurate, timely and ongoing situational intelligence of the event to the Incident Command Staff.

The SPR points to ongoing Functional Capability Gaps within many of the portions of the POETE that will be addressed by the purchase of the noted equipment:
 “Allocating and Mobilizing Resources” and “Ensuring Unity of Effort”

The Las Vegas Fire & Rescue Arson/Bomb Squad will assist public safety throughout all areas of Clark County (LV, NLV,

Henderson, Sandy Valley, Primm, Boulder City, Mesquite, Overton, Searchlight, Jean, Sloan and Laughlin).

In performance of this diverse and specialized mission, we utilize numerous types of sophisticated, technical X-ray, detection, classification and identification equipment. In order to maintain the state of preparedness required for prevention, protection, response, mitigation and recovery missions related to bomb and improvised explosive device incidents.

This investment covers Las Vegas Fire & Rescue Arson/Bomb Squad working in a synergistic approach from various geographic locations. The sustainment and enhancement of the equipment and capabilities of Las Vegas Fire & Rescue will allow the strengthening of the Arson/Bomb Squad and NV CBRNE Task Force in protecting the Las Vegas Urban Area.

12. Please explain your project's nexus to terrorism.

From the World Trade Center bombing in February 1993, the Oklahoma City bombing April 1995, Northwest Airlines Flight 253 attempted "underwear" bombing December 2009, and the Boston bombing April 2013 it is recognized that improvised explosive devices (IEDs) are and have been the weapons of choice for terrorists and criminals to damage critical infrastructure and inflict casualties to our citizens. IEDs have been and continue to be used throughout the world and within the United States with great success. While our countermeasures have evolved to address the use of IEDs, so have the tactics used by terrorists and criminals.

The use of IEDs is a concern at all major events and large gatherings due to the inability to screen all parties that may enter or attend the events as seen in the Boston Marathon bombings. Terrorists and criminals are hiding their IED's in bags and backpacks to give them the ability to carry and deploy their devices to a location of their choosing with the intent to inflict the greatest amount of injury, all the while blending in with the crowds.

The best tactics bomb technicians can use given this trend is the utilization of X-ray systems. The use of X-ray systems has multiple benefits to the trained bomb technician. The first and most obvious benefit is it allows the bomb technician the ability to determine the presence of an IED that may be concealed within a bag or backpack. X-rays also help technicians to determine the best procedures to render the item safe. One final benefit is that high quality X-rays allow the bomb technician the ability to gather valuable intelligence on how the device was assembled and how it functions. This intelligence can be shared with local and federal partners to help guide future responses and the development of additional equipment to support bomb squad operations. Intelligence gathering and sharing is vital to bomb squad operations and supports the "Countering Improvised Explosive Devices" policy objectives and capabilities dated February 26, 2013 by President Obama.

As the only FBI Accredited bomb squad in Southern Nevada the Las Vegas Fire & Rescue Bomb Squad provides response support to all local and federal agencies located in Southern Nevada. Areas covered include all unincorporated and incorporated areas of Clark County; parts of Nye County including Pahrump, Tonopah, Beatty, and the Nevada National Security Site; parts of Esmeralda County including Goldfield; and most of the populated areas of Lincoln County. Within Clark County the unit is responsible to provide improvised explosive device response and standby support at all major events including Life is Beautiful, Electric Daisy Carnival, NASCAR, the Las Vegas Marathon, and the New Year's Eve celebration on Las Vegas Boulevard and Fremont Street. These events, and others, bring in an average of 3,689,667 visitors per month to Clark County. Due to the openness of most of these events, the number of attendees, and past practice of terrorists and criminals we must be prepared to address these threats here in the state of Nevada.

This equipment being sought will allow the Las Vegas Fire & Rescue Bomb Squad the ability to address this current trend of deployment of IEDs by providing LVFR bomb technicians the ability to quickly obtain high quality, savable X-ray images from a lightweight and portable system. This system would be deployed to X-ray multiple items quickly in an area where large crowds have gathered and are unable to evacuate as well in tactical operations during SWAT or active shooter situations. The images obtained can be shared with local and federal partners to help identify the construction style and material used in IEDs. This information can be shared nationally to other bomb technicians to look for trends in designs of IEDs and law enforcement to determine people or persons responsible for the manufacturing and deployment of the IED.

This goal focuses on the core capabilities of: Screening, Search and Detection and the target capabilities of CBRNE Detection with accurate and timely intelligence and information sharing. This project includes acquiring an X-Ray imaging system, training bomb technicians on its use, and deploying the system during calls for service and special events. This equipment will enhance current X-ray capabilities and enable bomb technicians to obtain high quality X-ray images quicker than current capabilities allow.

This equipment allows us to gather data on physical threats like Weapons of Mass Destruction. It will provide timely, accurate, and actionable information resulting from the planning, direction, collection, exploitation, processing, analysis, production, dissemination, evaluation. The exchange of intelligence, information, data, and/or knowledge gained by this

equipment is critical to Fire, FBI, Law enforcement, and other government and private sector partners to include local and regional Emergency Management.

The planning, direction, collection, exploitation, processing, analysis, production, dissemination, and evaluation will provide timely, accurate, and actionable information. The exchange of intelligence, information, data, and/or knowledge gained by this equipment is critical to the Las Vegas Fire & Rescue Bomb Squad and the Nevada Bomb Squad Task Force.

The Las Vegas Bomb Squad is the only Bomb Squad in Southern Nevada (Clark County) and supports the jurisdictions of, including but not limited to, the City of Las Vegas, City of North Las Vegas, Henderson, Boulder City, Nye County, Lincoln County and Esmeralda County. If called upon Las Vegas Bomb Squad is capable of responding State wide and assisting neighboring states. Federal agencies supported by Las Vegas Bomb Squad include but are not limited to FBI and ATF.

Providing the Hazmat Technicians of LVFR's Type 1 Hazmat team the opportunity to attend the National Domestic Preparedness Consortium (NDPC) training, with a nexus to terrorism, while on duty will enhance the national priority mission area of Response, with the corresponding core capabilities of Environment Response/Health and Safety, Mass Care Services, and Mass Search and Rescue Operations.

The NDPC is funded by Congress to enhance the preparedness of federal, state, local, and tribal emergency responders to reduce the Nation's vulnerability to incidents involving weapons of mass destruction, terrorism, and all-hazard high-consequence events by developing, delivering, and assessing plans, training, technical assistance, and exercises.

Preparedness Review (SPR).

The Las Vegas Fire & Rescue (LVFR) Hazardous Materials Team consists of 90 personnel that are trained to the NFPA 472 Hazmat Technician Level and is the largest Type 1 team in the State of Nevada. Through attrition, the team has lost the personnel trained to the Specialist levels for CBRNE and WMD responses.

The THIRA identifies gaps of: "The lack of readily available personnel trained and prepared in screening, detecting, and identifying threats limits this ability." It furthermore identifies "the increase in threats has created a lack of investment from organizations in personnel to become fully trained and experienced in location and identification of hazards for large volume crowds."

Although the training itself is free of charge to emergency responders, LVFR Hazmat personnel have not been able to attend the specialized training due to both personnel shortages and fiscal limitations for on backfill of response personnel during multi day trainings. Team members have not been authorized to attend the trainings on duty due to the cost associated with backfilling their positions and are unable to attend on their own time, uncompensated, due to mandatory force hire shifts.

Investing in the teams training by funding the backfill of the personnel to attend specialized training is an investment in the personnel and ultimately the community to continue to meet and/or improve the confidence ratings of the THIRA's SPR high priorities of Screening, Search, and Detection.

Consortium courses provide participants with realistic training environments designed to prepare and challenge professionals for incidents as a result of terrorist acts.

The project entails sending 30 Hazardous Material Technicians from the LVFR's HMRT to attend training at the performance and/or management level through the National Domestic Preparedness Consortium (NDPC) with a nexus to terrorism.

Ten personnel will attend courses each quarter.

The short term project outcome is the advancement of knowledge, skills and abilities for 30 Hazardous Materials Technician level personnel. This unit responds throughout all of southern Nevada as a force multiplier for the LVFR Bomb Squad and Metro ARMOR team for possible terrorism nexus events.

The BC of Special Operations or if that position is vacant, the AC of Operations will implement the selection process, manage the grant, and report on the proposed project quarterly.

Selection Process:

First preference will be personnel assigned to the hazmat stations, HMA (Station 3 and Station 8). If more than 30 personnel commit to the training, sonority in rank will be utilized with an equal number of personnel attending the training from each of the respective 3 shifts and ranks.

If 30 HMA personnel do not commit to the voluntary training opportunity, the unassigned members, HMu, of the hazmat team will be offered the opportunity to attend under the same parameters up to a total of 30 personnel, HMA and HMu, attending.

If there are any remaining openings below the 30 personnel, HMA members will be appointed to attend the training. The appointed personnel will be selected by their respective rank with the lowest volunteer rate having the highest number of appointed personnel being selected. Additionally, each station and platoon will have personnel selected based on the lowest number of personnel volunteering in their classification will having the highest number or appointed personnel selected. If two personnel are equal in all other considerations, the person with the lowest seniority will be appointed to attend the training. The appointed personnel will attend the training in accordance with the Local 1285 bargaining agreement clause for temporary reassignment for training purposes. The proposed plan is to have 10 personnel attend the trainings for the first three quarters and reserve the fourth quarter for previous cancellations.

In the event of a terrorist attack, the North Las Vegas EOC will serve as the centralized location of emergency response and recovery support operations. The importance of the EOC was demonstrated during the first year of the COVID-19 pandemic, and ensuring its security is a central priority of the NLV Emergency Operations team. This project to harden the EOC supports a number of Core Capabilities, including: Access Control and Identity Verification, Physical Protection Measures, Operational Coordination, and Intelligence and Information Sharing. In 2019, DHS-CISA conducted an infrastructure security and risk assessment on the North Las Vegas Fire Administration Building (FAB) which houses the primary EOC for the City of North Las Vegas. The study utilized the Protective Measures Index and Consequences Measurement Index to provide a comprehensive risk assessment report. Vulnerabilities of the building explicitly identified in the report include "(t)he lack of perimeter fencing" and "the lack of gates". Both of these vulnerabilities are addressed in the proposed project and align with the Physical Protective Measures Target of the 2021 SPR/THIRA.

11. Describe the investment or project, specifically how it addresses gaps and/or sustainment in the Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA)/Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR).

This question is specifically asked in the Investment Justification.

UASI funding is requested to harden the EOC by installing perimeter security measures to prevent unrestricted access to the facility. Trespassing and vandalism has been occurring more frequently in the past year, including unauthorized facility access by homeless individuals and vandalism/theft of vehicles. These incidents highlight the overall lack of security for the asset and the need to install physical protective measures. Specifically, funding will be used to construct a 7-foot fence around the perimeter of the building that includes two controlled access gates. The project will include environmental assessments and design engineering services, and will be assigned a project manager from the City of North Las Vegas Public Works team. The fencing will completely secure the facility and all entrances from unauthorized access, as well as protect from high speed ramming of the building from vehicles.

The THIRA was analyzed to determine the City's greatest threats and how to better prepare, respond to, mitigate, and recover in the event of an attack. As identified in the THIRA and SPR, an effective community response to emergencies relies on intelligence, situational awareness, and coordination of multi-jurisdictional and multi-discipline assets. A secure and functional EOC supports each of these goals. By strengthening the security of and controlling access to the EOC, this project helps prepare it for an attack while also ensuring it is ready to activate at full capacity in the event of a terrorist attack.

This project also addresses the Physical Protective Measures gap identified in the 2021 THIRA SPR. According to the Executive Summary, Physical Protective Measures Target #1, only 4% of publicly managed critical infrastructure facilities (which includes the North Las Vegas FAB/EOC) have incorporated recommendations from a recent risk and vulnerability assessment. The proposed project directly addresses this gap by completing a security improvement from a recently completed DHS assessment, which will help advance this goal.

The EOC is a central component to NIMS and ICS implementation. The Fire Administration Building is a high-value asset that could be targeted to disrupt Fire/EMT response and operational communications. If an enemy was able to also gather intelligence that the EOC was housed at the FAB, that information would increase the FAB's target value. Securing the North Las Vegas EOC both helps protect a high-value target from direct terrorist attack, while also ensuring that ongoing theft and vandalism don't diminish the capabilities of the EOC to respond to a terrorist attack when needed.

The outcome of the proposed project is a fence and access gate system that increases the security of the EOC, in response to a recent DHS vulnerability study. The new fence and access system will protect NLV Emergency Management and EMT/Fire staff on a daily basis, as well as add protection for all critical responding personnel when the EOC is activated. Securing the EOC will protect a valuable emergency management asset for Nevada to ensure it can operate at maximum capacity when the need arises to activate it. The project enhances the North Las Vegas Emergency Operations Center located in the North Las Vegas jurisdiction of Clark County.

The Assistant Emergency Management will oversee implementation of the proposed security upgrades. An engineer from the City's Public Works department will be assigned to project manage the improvements, including overseeing contracted environmental and design work and ensuring contractors complete the work within scope and the agreed upon timeframes. A staff member from the City's IT department will consult with the project manager and vendors to ensure any technology improvements (access gate functionality) is compatible with the City's existing systems and can be effectively managed and maintained in the long run. The project will also be assigned a Grant Officer and Grant Accountant from the City's Grant department to ensure compliance with all required terms and conditions (including 2CFR200), and provide accurate financial reporting.

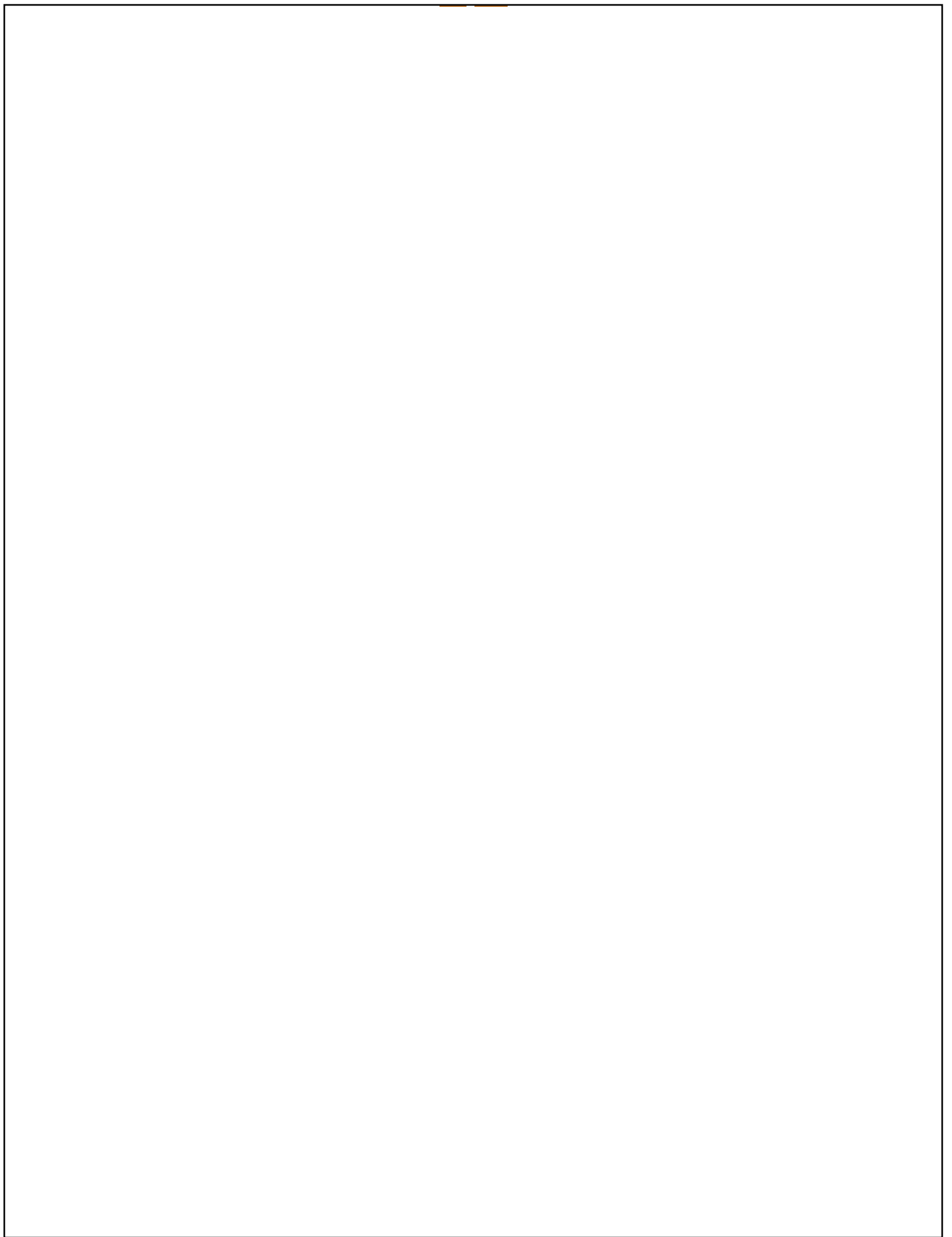

This dog responds to fires throughout the County in support of various Fire Department's efforts to identify where and how a fire started. Additionally, the canine is assigned as part of the US National Response Team. Recent US Health and Safety studies have identified issues with carcinogens remaining on turnouts, clothing and equipment used during suppression and investigation of fires. These carcinogens continue to off-gas hours after they have been used. Nationally, it is recommended that canine teams no longer use SUVs and move to pickup trucks. This allow the canine and handler to be in different compartment of the vehicle, while clothing and equipment are maintained in a separate compartment.
